

Another option is to listen to the **audio recording of the Sunday Service** on **0141 465 4638** from Sunday 2.30pm onwards. The call is charged at the local rate.

## **LETTER FROM OUR LOCUM MINISTER**

The old joke goes something like this:

Question: How many Elders does it take to change a light bulb?

Answer: Change? Why change?

Change is something that affects us all. Sometimes, it is straightforward to deal with. Our forebears lived without electricity and running water. Many of us can remember days when we didn't have indoor toilets and baths were something for which you had to travel. Those who are younger may recall the introduction of computers and mobile phones. Yet there aren't many who wish we didn't have our utilities, sanitation and electronic devices.

Likewise, we change our clothes, hairstyles, beds, carpets, décor and shoes; our bodies regenerate and change as we grow. We all live with change. Indeed, we often say things like, "I need a change", or "it's time for a change". When change is something we instigate, it is a powerful motivator.

The difficulties arise when we don't understand the need for change, or when the change is outwith our control, especially when we feel forced into it.

There is a significant factor confronting us as a congregation which will certainly involve change. I'm thinking of the process of calling a new minister. Are we ready at this point, or do we (or the things we do and the way we do them) need to change?

We are already contending with the changes brought about by the Covid-19 pandemic. That hasn't been easy and the end is not yet in sight. Perhaps more change will be required. Yes, there are interesting days ahead for us. Change and consideration of change is beckoning. Do we need to change? Are we ready for change? Are we willing to change? The precise detail and nature of any change may not yet be visible, but it is coming. Do not fear it; embrace it. Remember, change can bring blessings and growth.

The best way to approach a time of change is to focus our minds on God and seek His will in prayer. God is dependable and faithful. He is in control of all things. He is there before the change, ever-present during the change and continues to be there after the change.

Have a look at Psalm 46 and see how the Psalmist reacts to being threatened. These verses show that his trust remains in the Lord:

"The Lord of hosts is with us; the God of Jacob is our fortress

Psalm 46 verses 7 and 11. (English Standard Version)

God, grant us discernment, wisdom and vision as we look to the future, with all the possibilities which change presents.

## **NEWS FROM STONELAW'S KIRK SESSION WORSHIP COMMITTEE**

Session recently formed a Worship Committee to plan our worship up to Christmas.

We have decided to invite our uniformed organisations to join us on Zoom on Remembrance Sunday, 8th November, as it is not possible to have our customary 'parade' service due to Covid restrictions.

We arranged our usual Christmas services and look forward to Discoverers taking part on Sunday 20th December.

We also decided to continue using Zoom for Sunday worship, but with the Rev John Martindale leading worship from the Sanctuary, starting on Sunday, 8th November. Our organist, Alan Jenkins will be there, along with Erin, on violin. Joanne will also host the Zoom service from the church but there will be no congregation, at least in the short term.

Session had successfully trialled Presbytery's recommendations for public worship in the Sanctuary at a Wednesday service in September. So the Wednesday 2pm service will restart on the 28th October, followed two weeks later on the 11th November. It is not possible to have any music or singing at these fortnightly services but Rev John will lead worship with Bible readings and prayers. ## **CHALLENGES TO US AS CHURCH**

In a recent Facebook post,\* Pete Greig - respected author, Tear Fund Ambassador, Senior Pastor of Emmaus Rd Church, Guildford, and founder of the global 24-7 Prayer Movement (whose videos on prayer have been appreciated by members of Stonelaw) - writes about recent conversations with two Christian men, both highly involved in congregational life, but now 'repelled by Christianity' because of 'the terrible, appalling attitudes held and atrocities done by its leaders'.

This is strong language, and Pete Greig does not spell out these 'attitudes' and 'atrocities', no doubt in the interests of discretion and confidentiality, but admits that he feels sad as a Christian and as a church leader.

Pete's article is meant to shock and challenge all those of us 'safely within the fold' - because the 'ninety-nine' in our church family need to be nourished by us, even while we search for the 'one lost sheep'.

Here are some of Pete Greig's challenges to us, as Church:

- We aspire to be good witnesses to the world...yet at times we can alienate and even hurt our own family. Our sons and daughters are leaving the fold by the thousand. The Gospel is not the problem we in the church family are the problem.
- We must do more than just preach the Gospel and try to be nice. We must also urgently, practically, nurture communities of healing and Gospel life.
- We need systemic change in the institutional church. And, of course, we must hold leaders to account whilst raising up women and men whose integrity matches their ability.
- We must be done with sentiment and nostalgia. There is hard graft dirty and difficult work to be done: first, burying the dead religious rituals despised by Jesus (it won't be popular), and then actively building the living, loving community he actually came to establish.
- We must also be prepared to go on many long journeys with those we have lost, listening to them respectfully and befriending them unconditionally. One whiff of Bible-bashing and they will run a mile. But give it a few more chats over a few more months and there may well come a night, when one or other of these men will turn to me and finally say 'OK, talk to me about the Jesus stuff. How can you really believe all that rubbish? Tell me more.'

## TREASURER'S REPORT

#### Dear Friends

There has been a temptation to turn every Treasurer's update since traditional Sunday worship was suspended by Covid-19 into an appeal to the congregation. Recognising that there will be members of the congregation feeling the impact of government restrictions on their jobs and livelihoods, and not wanting to overburden people with appeals, I have tried to hold off on making a formal financial appeal until it is absolutely necessary.

Unfortunately we have now reached the point where it has become absolutely necessary to make a financial appeal to the congregation. Under normal circumstances, I would be making one from the front of the Church.

I would be very grateful if you could give this appeal, and the explanation of our financial position below, your prayerful consideration.

Using our financial position in September as a base, I have started forecasting what our position will look like come the end of the year. While we seem to have avoided the risk of depleting the General Fund in the year, I am currently forecasting a significant deficit that could reach as high as £10,000. This appears to result from a combination of the reduction in contributions from organisations impacted by Covid-19 and the loss of ordinary offerings.

This being the case, I would be very grateful if those who are able to do so would prayerfully consider increasing their donations to the Church.

To give the congregation as full a picture as possible – although our immediate focus is on the General Fund - I would also like to discuss the position of the Fabric Fund and the Development Worker Fund.

The Fabric Fund currently holds approximately £23,000. However, Managers have identified approximately £6,900 worth of fabric costs as necessary. (For details, see Stuart Menzies' update on p.12) While the General Fund is in deficit, we will not be able to rebuild a reserve in the Fabric fund once this expenditure is made. This is an issue which will require to be considered by the Kirk Session and Managers.

Finally, the Development Worker fund is the one area of our finances which has not been impacted by Covid-19. Thanks to the work of the Development Worker Management committee and the support of those who donate to the fund, the balance in that fund at the end of September was approximately £9,100. While the Development Worker Fund is under less strain than the General Fund and the Fabric Fund, I would like to make it clear that the donations to this fund are still necessary; I would ask those who donate to it not to divert those donations to other funds.

This being the case, I would like to include a reminder on the next page, for anyone who wishes to do so, of the ways in which you can donate to Stonelaw Church.

#### **TEXT DONATION SERVICE**

#### **GIFT AID**

No message from the Treasurer would be complete without a reminder about Gift Aid.

If you are a UK taxpayer, donating through the Gift Aid scheme means that we are able to claim back 25 pence for every £1 that you give - without your giving anything extra.

## MANAGERS' CHURCH FABRIC UPDATE

This year has been very different for all of us. Although we haven't been worshipping in our sanctuary for over half the year, the Managers have had the continuing task of looking after our building. Having now gone through the Church of Scotland's reopening process (in two phases: firstly the halls and secondly the Sanctuary) we have had to address various issues as well as the routine maintenance of our building and the manse. This article details the main areas which have needed attention.

## **ELECTRICAL 'C2' ITEMS**

Every five years we are required to undertake a fixed electrical installation inspection. This took place in February (costing just over £1,400) and identified a number of 'C2' and 'C3' defects. The 'C2' defects are classed as "potentially dangerous" and require attention, whereas 'C3' defects are where improvements are recommended. (There are also 'C1' defects – these are where there is an imminent danger – but fortunately we didn't have any of these).

For insurance purposes we have to rectify all 'C2' defects and we instructed the electrical contractor to do these in March. In normal times, these should have been done in a few weeks but, of course, this year has been very different to normal. When lockdown came, like so many in the construction industry, our contractor put most of his staff into furlough.

In following the reopening guidance issued by the Church of Scotland, we were informed that rectifying the 'C2' items was a mandatory part of the process before Presbytery would allow us to reopen our halls (Phase 1 of our reopening). At this stage we thought it would be straightforward to get our contractor out to sort the defects. Unfortunately, the contractor had a backlog of work (with other churches in a similar situation to ourselves). We managed to resolve this by using our local electrician (he had a large job cancelled and was able to start straight away – this was a real answer to prayer).

The cost of these works was just under £700.

#### **PLUMBING WORKS**

In the reopening process, one of the requirements was to ensure our hot and cold water systems were fully compliant with legionella (Legionnaires' disease) guidance. Unfortunately, the toilets off the main hall were not compliant. In particular, this requires hot water temperatures to be above 50°C. As a short-term measure, we were able to increase the thermostat on the hot water tank; however, when making these adjustments we discovered a small leak in the tank. Our plumber has recommended its replacement.

One consequence of the higher hot water temperatures is the need to fit thermostatic mixer valves at each sink to ensure we avoid a scald risk. In addition, again to address the risk of legionella, we have identified various other issues which we need to address – such as removing "dead legs" (these are lengths of pipes which don't connect to anything allowing water to stagnate – a known legionella risk factor). Furthermore, there are various minor plumbing issues which need addressed. The total cost of all these works is just over £1,900 (excluding VAT). We have recently accepted a quotation for this work and hope to have it completed shortly.

#### **ROOF WORKS**

Presently we are awaiting quotes for work on our roof. This will cover both maintenance (principally gutter cleaning) and repairing leaks above the north-west stairwell and the south side of the sanctuary. We are also asking for quotes to install bird spikes at some of the windows to address the ongoing problem of pigeons (and the health risk they bring). The total cost of this may be around £5,000.

#### THE MANSE

This year, although we are in the process of selling the manse, we have had various repairs. These have included the kitchen roof and gutters and the front roof. Other necessary works have included repairing the alarm system. The total cost of these was almost £1,300.

#### **FABRIC FUND**

Much of the expenditure detailed above comes from our Fabric Fund. As detailed in the Treasurer's report this fund is going to be significantly depleted by these works, especially as this year we have little or no incoming funds earmarked for Fabric. The Managers ask you to consider prayerfully a donation that is specifically for this fund. Indeed if you are able to you may wish to give to one of the items that has been highlighted above. #### NOTE

For the plumbing and roof works on the church building, as it is a listed structure (Grade B) and as these will almost certainly cost more than £1,000, we should be able to reclaim the VAT element through the Listed Places of Worship Scheme – which of course would help significantly with this cost.

In case you haven't already heard, the BBC Scotland Channel has introduced a new programme, 'The Service', which is shown live at 12 noon on Sunday mornings and is available afterwards on the BBC iPlayer.

'The Service' is described as 'a series of religious service from a number of faiths across Scotland at a time when attendance at normal places of worship is not possible.' In the last two months, nearly all the services have been Christian.

## **NEWS OF ORGANISATIONS USING OUR CHURCH BUILDINGS**

## STONELAW PRESCHOOL

The Stonelaw Preschool, like all schools and nurseries, was forced to close in March when we went into lockdown. This left our building empty of all its usual activities, until August when the Preschool was able to reopen. Before this, we had to meet the Church of Scotland's reopening requirements: to check that our building was safe, including checking our cold and hot water systems (see p.12)

We also had to adopt a new letting agreement with specific COVID-19 clauses requiring the Preschool to submit risk assessments and operating plans detailing various procedures, e.g. how they would clean their spaces, signage, social distancing measures and strategies to minimise the risk of spreading the virus. For example, the children now stay in two "bubbles", one based in the Crèche Room and the other in the Mid-Hall.

In addition, consent was needed from the Kirk Session and Glasgow Presbytery before reopening the halls. This was a substantial task which was achieved in a very short time. We had our approval on Saturday 15<sup>th</sup> August and Preschool resumed the next week.

For the Preschool, this new term also marks a new daily format. Previously there were two separate sets of children in the morning and afternoon. As the Scottish Government has increased the number of free nursery hours, the Preschool have adapted their format accordingly. They now have just one set of children each day (with lunch being provided).

In addition to the halls, the Preschool has the use of the garden area on the south side of church. As part of their COVID-19 response, nurseries are being encouraged to have the children outside as much as possible, so, to help with this, they applied successfully for a grant to upgrade the garden with a new shelter and activities. The first stage of this work was completed during the October break.

I hope you will agree that it is really good news that our building is once again being used on a daily basis by 17 local children and the Preschool staff. Of course, we really want to get back to how it was before COVID, with other organisations using our halls. Please pray that we can find ways of bringing more organisations and church activities back to Stonelaw in the months to come.

#### CALDERWOOD OUT OF SCHOOL AND HOLIDAY CLUB

Over the last ten years our halls have been used by Calderwood Out of School Club to provide childcare during the school holidays. This is run by Vetinia Gorman. With the successful reopening of the halls, Vetinia applied to the Kirk Session to use the Main Hall for the September weekend and the October break. Like the Preschool, the club had to sign up to a COVID letting agreement and submit risk assessments and operating procedures for approval. Session agreed to these in September, and the club used our halls during the October break.

The reopening of the Preschool and the Out of School Club not only brings Stonelaw some much-needed income, but also marks the first small steps back to having our building used as it should: to serve our community.



## REMEMBRANCE UNDER RESTRICTION

## **SATURDAY 17TH OCTOBER**

## Dear Friends,

We are familiar with Hamlet's words from Shakespeare's pen about the choice between continuing with a difficult life or ending it. Sombre words indeed, but very much in tune with the modern spirit of sharing our troubles and speaking openly about our mental health. For Shakespeare, the unknown prospect of the afterlife: "to sleep - to sleep, perchance to dream?" tilted his choice towards continuing with this life, for all its slings and arrows of outrageous fortune.

The Christian's hope is in Jesus and His resurrection from death. We too have slings and arrows to bear in this life but we are encouraged to "Look to Jesus, the author and finisher of our faith" Hebrews ch12 v2.

So what should we make of the Coronavirus pandemic? Specifically, should we reopen Stonelaw for public worship, albeit a different kind of worship with social distancing, no hymns and not even a cup of coffee and a chat afterwards?

To be open or not to be open, that is the question Session has been considering for some months. Our Zoom services have been a great success by any measure, with our Locum

Rev John Martindale leading worship faithfully and even performing some tricks to entertain the children. Other churches without online worship have had to or have chosen to reopen more quickly to meet the spiritual needs of their congregations.

To reopen or not reopen, that is a tricky question. To open our sanctuary just now, when the virus is spreading so much that Government and Presbytery advice is to reduce our activities, seems perverse. Yet to ignore the needs of our congregation seems cruel. What to do?

Session will shortly come to a conclusion about public worship in the sanctuary. (see p 4) Meanwhile, may I make a simple suggestion which we can all consider acting upon, for our own good and that of others?

Pick up the phone and invite someone you know to meet up, perhaps for a walk in a park or for a coffee and a chat in one of our local cafes. No need for a rota or permission from anyone. Why not try it, if you aren't doing so already? I think it will be good for our fellowship, good for our health, physical and mental, and good for our souls.
