Letter from our Interim Moderator

It does, however, seem strange to me that, though I have been with you since early June, I have yet to meet you face to face (or face-mask to face-mask) in the same room.

Letter from the Treasurer

Dear Friends

A lot has happened since the last time the magazine was distributed, when I wrote to update the congregation on Stonelaw's finances. I am happy to tell you that this report will be considerably more optimistic than the one I shared in May. However, I would like to emphasise that it is a very cautious optimism. While our financial position is better than I had feared it could be, we have still seen a negative impact on our income as a result of the pandemic, and our financial position remains uncertain.

In the year to the end of the July, expenditure from the General Fund exceeded income by approximately £4,000. This is £2,000 worse than my original budget for 2020. However, it is £6,000 better than the projection I did in May (which was based on offerings in April). This is largely due to the generosity of the congregation. As Treasurer, I do have to share my sincere gratitude to everyone who has taken the time to find an alternative way of donating offerings to the Church. I am sure that everyone in the congregation, and all those who have been praying for the work of the Church, would join me in thanking you.

Although our financial position is not as bad as it could have been, the Church still depends on offerings to be able to continue. While there have been some cost savings from the enforced closure of the church, the building remaining empty has resulted in plumbing work urgently needing addressed and there are other fabric matters which also require attention, both to keep the building wind and watertight and to ensure that we meet our Health and Safety obligations towards the congregation.

This being the case, I would like to include a reminder of the ways in which you can donate to Stonelaw, for anyone who wishes to do so.

Standing order/ online banking.

Either a one-off payment or a standing order can be set up using online banking. For those who use online banking, our bank details are:

Please remember that you are free to cancel a standing order at any time.

Posting a cheque

We are able to accept donations by cheque. These should be made out to Stonelaw Parish Church and posted to our Free Will Offering treasurer:

Text donation service

We have set up a text donation service to allow donations by text for those who are not able to use online banking or cheques. To use this, text **STONELAWCH** followed by the number of pounds you wish to donate e.g. **STONELAWCH 5** to donate £5. Send your text to this number: **70085**.

If you use this service we will not keep a record of your phone number or use it to contact you for any reason.

Gift Aid

No message from the Treasurer would be complete without a reminder about Gift Aid. If you are a UK taxpayer, donating through the Gift Aid scheme means that we are able to claim back 25 pence for every £1 that you give - without giving anything extra. If you would like to give using the Gift Aid scheme, you will need to complete a declaration form (also on http://stonelawchurch.org/giving) which should be completed and returned to lain Morrison as the Freewill Offering Treasurer (Flat G/L, 5 Parkhill Drive, Rutherglen, G73 2PJ). If possible, please keep lain updated with any changes to either the way you give, or the amount, so that he can keep his records accurately.

Finally, I realise there has been a significant change to the format of the Treasurer's Report in the last few months. I am happy to provide the more detailed table on request.

Stonelaw Church Manse Update

In our seventh month of vacancy, one area that may not have been front of mind for many is where our new minister will live – the manse. When we entered vacancy, a committee was appointed whose remit was to review the existing manse, looking for any works required (and their cost) to ensure that the accommodation reached the standard expected. In addition, the committee was asked to consider the alternative of selling the current manse and buying a more modern property, if this was better use of available resources. The committee and representatives of Glasgow Presbytery property committee thoroughly inspected the property and concluded that although it has a very good location and has considerable merit as a family home, it would be necessary to carry out significant refurbishment work, including:

- replacement of both the bathroom and shower room
- a reconfiguring of the kitchen's layout
- replacement of some, or perhaps all, of the carpets and curtains
- renewal of some of the wall coverings (and potential re-plastering)

In addition, some exterior painting, repairs and improvements were required, leading to a potential cost of between £25,000 and £50,000.

The committee considered the matter fully, taking into consideration the ongoing costs of heating and maintaining an Edwardian building at 21st century standards. It concluded that the improvements necessary to upgrade the present property were substantial, and even after completion the property would not be the most suitable one for the future purposes of the church. It was proposed that the present manse should be sold and a more appropriate one purchased, with the aim that there would be no significant net cost to the congregation.

This recommendation was accepted by the Kirk Session on 2nd June 2020.

So what happens now?

The remit of the committee has been revised: to prepare the manse for sale and find a replacement property. In addition to weekly inspections (an insurance requirement), the essential work carried out includes:

- Fixing the 'wobbly' kitchen floor
- Repairs to external guttering
- Internal and external painting where necessary
- Tidying the garden

Despite a delay due to Covid-19 restrictions, with the easing of lockdown and the reopening of estate agents, we should soon be in a position to put the property on the market. We will, of course, be taking professional advice as to the timing.

New Manse

We are aware of the need to ensure that a prospective new minster can view the new manse. The Church of Scotland has quite specific requirements for a manse property, and in addition, we need to ensure that it is in a suitable location to serve Stonelaw Church. It is hoped that a new manse will be identified and recommended to the Kirk Session at the earliest opportunity. We will keep you updated with our progress.

Dear Supporters,

Here at LHM we are preparing and planning, as best we can, for the year ahead. The continuation of temporary housing support for the homeless via Government funding is uncertain but we shall continue to respond dynamically to the unfolding situation by delivering pastoral, advocacy and sustenance support wherever we can.

We continue to provide food and toiletries parcels to the frontline street outreach teams from our partner agencies. If you have not visited our Facebook page we would encourage you to 'like' and 'share' and help us to raise awareness of all the work going on to make a difference in the lives of individuals with a lived experience of homelessness across the city.

NEWS FROM OUR LOCAL FOOD BANK

This update on the Rutherglen & Cambuslang Food Bank is for local churches.

We had to suspend our services in March, mainly because of our duty to protect all our users, including our volunteers from Covid-19. We are grateful to Camglen Covid Support who promptly stepped in and provided a comprehensive food service to people in need during the past few months. We now hope to reopen mid-September, in Saint Columbkille's Church Hall, Rutherglen, in Cambuslang Baptist Church and in Whitlawburn, Community Resource Centre. We are extremely grateful to each of these centres for helping us to meet the required Covid-19 guidelines. We will advise in due course of confirmed dates via social media, i.e. on our Facebook page, our website, on Twitter, and by email.

WAREHOUSE FACILITIES

Some of you may also be aware that we are seeking new warehouse facilities. The Foodbank has enjoyed rent-free use of warehouse facilities in Saint Columbkille's since the Foodbank started some 8 years ago. This has been very generous and we extend our thanks to Saint Columbkille's for this. Unfortunately, as demand for Foodbank services has grown, so has the amount of food requiring to be stored and we have simply outgrown the warehouse space in Saint Columbkille's. At the time of writing, we are positively exploring a new warehouse area which will hopefully meet our current and future needs.

The Food Bank could not exist were it not for the very generous donations of food, time and support which you, as an important part of our local community, continue to give us. While we anticipate an increasing demand for our services as a result of the pandemic, we would ask that you bear with us and do not make further donations until we are settled into our new warehouse, as we will need time to organise food stock etc. Please be reassured however, that we will, of course, come back to you at a later date when we need your donations (which we will!!!).

FOODBANK MANAGER

Our Foodbank Manager who was appointed in March 2019, and has been invaluable to the smooth running of the Foodbank, is leaving in September. We are, therefore, seeking a replacement for this 24 hours per week post. We would be very grateful if you would bring this opportunity to the attention of your congregations, friends and colleagues. Acousticnights@the Meeting Place had been running successfully in Stonelaw Church for twelve years before lockdown. The intimate space created an atmosphere of togetherness and 'family'.

When the lockdown happened, there could be no more Acoustic Nights in the church building. We had been booked up for the next 18 months and had to let folk know that their gigs had been cancelled. We felt so bad for them. After all, for many, these events are their livelihood.

We happened to read a Facebook notification about one such musician who was very worried about not being able to pay his mortgage and other bills. He was pleading for help. We decided to go 'online' and Ian Bruce was our first guest at Acousticnight ONLINE.

The audience, now virtual, (but we knew most of them as loyal Meeting Place regulars) donated what they would normally have given at the door. Ian got nearly 700 views that night for his video on YouTube and was quite overwhelmed! As a result he now has his own channel.

There were many musicians in the same boat, so we decided to make Acousticnight ONLINE a weekly event. About half of our guests requested that donations be made to a charity of their choosing. The charities which have benefitted so far are: The Lodging House Mission, MS Support Mid Argyle, Glasgow City Mission, National Trust for Scotland, Salvation Army Easterhouse Covid Support, Rutherglen & Cambuslang Food Bank, Bethany Christian Trust, MOJO(Miscarriage of Justice Organisation), Masks4Heroes and Foodbank Fife.

Parents appreciated spending more time at home as a family, especially sharing meals together, when normally, working hours can make that difficult. Those who couldn't see family and friends loved talking to them on the phone, Face-timing them on their computers or taking part in family Zoom quizzes.

Isn't it amazing what you can do when you're not out and about? Several homes had wonderful aromas coming from the kitchen as we had more time for baking and cooking. What healthy hobbies some of us took up, including walking (and discovering new local parks) cycling, jogging, yoga, aerobics and gardening! There are, however, those of us who could not take part in these activities, for a variety of reasons. But that didn't stop us from enjoying chatting to folk, reading, doing jigsaws, knitting and sewing. The lockdown also gave us a good chance to catch up on TV programmes, films and listening to music, and in one child's case, learning how to order toys on eBay!

Last, but certainly not least, many of us have enjoyed getting to know more people in the church through Zoom video-conferencing. Only a few months ago, most of us hadn't heard of this technology but now it is bringing people together online and has helped many of us to attend church services, prayer meetings, House Groups, Tuesday Chat, Discoverers and more. One person commented, "I like seeing faces on Zoom on a Sunday morning, instead of the backs of heads!" And the Stonelaw WhatsApp group has become a community grapevine which helps us to share news, favourite Bible verses and songs, and to support each other.

It is heartening that this list of benefits outweighs the challenges. As we continue in Phase Three, let us give thanks to God for His goodness and His many blessings to us in what has been a rather testing time.
