MESSAGE FROM NEIL



Dear Friends,

I always used to laugh when people said that time would pass more quickly the older you get. However, I must be getting older because it seems like no time at all since I was preparing myself for another run up to Christmas; yet by the time you are reading this we will be very much in Advent. Advent is all about getting ourselves ready to celebrate the

coming of Jesus, God with us, and it is important that we prepare ourselves well.

JOSEPH – THE BYSTANDER

Have you ever felt like a by-stander? A person who is in the midst of all that is happening but you feel that no one notices you? You have tried your best but it doesn't seem good enough? I think that Joseph maybe felt like this. Perhaps he felt that he had done all the right things but people were more interested in Mary, the shepherds, the wise men and, of course, the baby.

Sometimes, I feel sorry for Joseph; maybe that's because I've seen so many Nativity plays where Joseph just stands and says almost nothing! However, incidents happened which Joseph would never have thought possible and these events formed his character. Joseph can teach us very important lessons.

The Bible tells us that Joseph was a righteous man whose actions towards Mary showed his extreme kindness and sensitivity. He willingly obeyed God, risking severe humiliation and is a wonderful example of integrity and godly character.

It is not easy to entrust your child to someone else but that is exactly what happened when God entrusted Joseph with a great responsibility – His Son. Joseph had God's trust.

Joseph's leading quality was, without question, his righteousness: his willingness to obey God even though he did not always know the details. He knew that God would lead him to the next step.

Walking in obedience to God isn't always straightforward. We can face problems and struggles as Joseph did, but we can trust God to lead and guide us.

So, next time you see Joseph on a Christmas card or in a Nativity Play, remember - he most certainly is not a by-stander. Joseph can teach us very valuable lessons for life.

Tearfund and Christian Aid have together invited us to join many thousands of their supporters across the UK in sending our Prime Minister a Christmas card.

At COP26, Boris Johnson spoke some strong words about climate change– but will the UK government follow through?

When it comes to climate action, the proof is in the pudding!

Some of you may already have signed the Giant Christmas Card online; that deadline has now passed. The giant card, with 50,000 names, has been sent to the printers and will be handed in at No.10 Downing Street on 15th December. You may see some media reports!

You can still join the campaign, by sending your own hand-written card to the PM. Just follow these three simple steps:

1. Choose or create your card. A shop-bought card works fine, or you might like to create a homemade card that represents your message.

2. Write your message

You can use the suggested message below as a starting point, but choosing your own words and keeping it simple will give it more impact.

Dear Prime Minister,

My hope this Christmas is that the UK secures more finance for those hit hardest by the climate crisis. You have said rich countries must find this money, but COP26 did not deliver.

In 2022, please push for more climate finance, stronger national plans to keep 1.5°C alive and a just transition to renewable energy. I/We wish you a peaceful Christmas

3. Post your card.

several other government dignitaries, who had been attending COP26 in Glasgow. The Glasgow Fijian Association welcomed them to our church for a small service followed by a huge feast.



More than 50 people attended the event, including our own Ann McLintock, while the welcome address was delivered by Vetinia Gorman.

WASTE NOT, WANT NOT

When they were all full, Jesus said to his disciples, "Gather the pieces left over, let us not waste a bit." John 6:12 (Good News version.)

Although the slogan, 'waste not, want not', was used during World War 2, it was, allegedly, first recorded in 1772. There is an even earlier version dated 1576: "wilful waste makes woeful want." So for centuries, society has been aware that waste is not good, and yet we have become a society in which everything is disposable. The appalling results are only too evident in recent images from around the world.

REDUCE, REUSE, RECYCLE is the slogan of today for tomorrow. Read about these three Rs at <u>www.reducereuserecycle.co.uk</u> or ask a friend to print the information out for you.

REDUCE means to reduce the amount of the earth's resources you use and the amount of waste you produce.

REUSE means don't just bin it! Could you or someone else use it? **RECYCLE** means making materials into something new.



HOW CAN WE REDUCE THE AMOUNT OF EARTH'S RESOURCES WE USE?

Two simple changes we could make to our shopping habits, which would reduce single use packaging and therefore waste, are firstly, to shop at a zero waste shop and secondly to have our milk delivered in glass bottles.

The Good Choice - 1031 Cathcart Rd, Mount Florida, Glasgow G42 9XJ is a zero waste shop which allows customers to refill their own containers, thus eliminating packaging.

Our last magazine contained a few suggestions of eco-friendly choices we can make to help to reduce our use of plastic in the bathroom. Here are a few more simple changes we can make, this time in the kitchen:

- Beeswax wraps instead of clingfilm to cover bowls or to wrap sandwiches
- Paper bags for sandwiches.
- Clingfilm that contains no plastic and is degradable.
- Degradable bin liners.
- Plastic free alternatives to sponges .
- Plastic free tea bags (yes, there's plastic in most tea bags!)
- Loose tea and paper tea bags or a diffuser

INFORMATION FROM PREVIOUS ISSUES OF THE MAGAZINE

UPDATED GUIDANCE FOR SUNDAY MORNING SERVICES

1. In order to avoid people having to queue before services there is a system for entering the building. If you are checking in using your Smartphone and our QR code, please enter using the South Door (i.e. the entrance without a ramp). Otherwise, please enter via the North Door (the entrance with a ramp). Of course, everyone who needs to can use the ramp, no matter how they intend to check in.

2.A camera is in use on a Sunday morning so that our service can be recorded and displayed on our website. Please note that the chancel and the area in front of the door to the right of the chancel are in view of the camera and if you are in this area you may be seen and recorded.

CHURCH OFFERING

We are still unable to pass the plate on a Sunday during the service. However, there will be a collection plate available at the door for anyone who wishes to give their offering in this way.

TEXT DONATION SERVICE

We have set up a text donation service to allow donations by text for those who are not able to use online banking or cheques. To use this service, text **STONELAWCH** followed by the number of pounds you wish to donate to **70085.** E.g. **STONELAWCH 5** to donate £5. If you are thinking of using this service, then please remember that we will not keep a record of your phone number or use it to contact you for any reason.

GIFT AID

If you are a UK taxpayer, donating to the church through the Gift Aid scheme means that we are able to claim back 25 pence for every £1 that you give – at no extra cost to you. Dear Friends

I hope this email finds you well, as we enter into the season of Advent.

As I prepare things for the final run in to the calendar year, I have been reflecting a lot on Advent recently which is actually the first 'season' in the new church year. It is, of course, that period of time immediately before Christmas when we get ready to celebrate Jesus' birth.

We will be lighting our first Advent candle this Sunday and then a new one will be lit every Sunday leading up to Christmas. The centre candle is lit on Christmas day and is a symbol of Jesus, who is the Light of the World.

One tradition surrounding the meaning of the candles claims that the first candle is the candle of hope. The second candle is the candle of peace. The third candle is known as the candle of love and the fourth candle represents joy.

Each of the four candles can also represent people who prepared for the coming of Jesus, such as the prophets, John the Baptist, and Mary. It is no surprise that we too use the lighting of the candles to help us to prepare ourselves for celebrating the coming of Jesus.

I have also written a short devotional book^{*}, which will be sent to you all by email at the beginning of next week. This devotional will allow us to journey through Luke's Gospel together. I have entitled this book 'Tread Lightly' and we will read a chapter of Luke each day and spend time reflecting on the questions and prompts that each passage throws up. My hope is that it will allow us not to rush through Advent but to spend a bit of time each day in God's Word, preparing ourselves to celebrate the birth of Saviour on the 25th of December.
