PAST TIMES – DEMENTIA FRIENDLY CAFÉ UPDATE



A lot has happened since our last update in the November magazine. Past Times first opened on November 10th, 2021 and met again on December 8th.

In December we welcomed ten people living with dementia and their carers who

had registered with us. We followed a similar format to the first meeting - lots of tea, coffee and cake - and we also introduced our new visitors to those who had attended the first meeting. The highlight of the event was when our minister sang and played the guitar for a singsong of Christmas carols. The Meeting Place capacity is limited so we set up tables and chairs in our Sanctuary to allow plenty of space for everyone.

Moving forward, this will be our regular venue because we have so many people wishing to come to our café. (Please note, we ask that people register with us before attending Past Times so that we can control numbers.) Having begun with four pairs of people we knew from our own and a neighbouring church, we then began to liaise with local health professionals, including Eastvale Older Adult Community Mental Health Team, based in Rutherglen Health Centre. We have now had a number of people referred to us from this team, including two more pairs in the last few weeks. We have also had referrals from the Lanarkshire Adviser from Alzheimer Scotland. In February, this adviser is going to deliver 'Dementia Friends' training for our volunteers.

We were disappointed not to be able to meet in January, but the levels of Covid in our area meant that this was not advisable. Then on 21st January, we received wonderful news. Past Times has received funding from the Community Mental Health and Well-being Fund. The fund aims to support and encourage initiatives that promote and benefit the mental health and well-being of people in the community at a small scale, grassroots, community level. It was launched by the Scottish Government with £15 million allocated to support adult mental health and well-being in communities across Scotland. The money we have received will last for two years and will allow us to:

- Buy equipment, puzzles and games which will help us to stimulate and entertain our visitors living with dementia, while their carers can have time to chat and share experiences etc.
- Pay for musicians and/or musical therapists, who will be able to provide great stimulation and enjoyment for everyone there.
- 'Hire' the Sanctuary on an official basis, which will help to pay the significant cost of heating. (We have outgrown the Café area and the downstairs hall is not accessible for our visitors, many of whom have mobility issues.)

So, exciting times lie ahead, as this money will allow us to offer a much better service to our visitors. But the work will only be possible because of our volunteers. They are: Jill Rennie, Moira Shaw, Liz Tait, Diane Broadfoot, Mabel Moore, Mabel Crawford, Tricia Finlayson, Marlene Galt and Linda Allison.

What is The Well, and why are we supporting its work on 27th February?



Our February 27th, our Retiral Offering is for The Well, a multi-cultural resource centre based in the heart of Govanhill and originally set up by the Church of Scotland. If you don't know much about this organisation, the best person to ask is our own George Morrison who, until a couple of years ago, volunteered there regularly - for over 15 years.

The support provided by The Well is greatly appreciated by those who are disadvantaged through poverty, racism, limited English language skills - and for some - just being new to life in the UK. At present the Well is fund-raising for a move to bigger premises nearby; they have already raised more than a third of the £140,000 required. They still hope to be awarded grants, but our support through the Retiral Offering would be very encouraging.

UPDATE ON THE ROOF REPAIRS

In November's magazine I reported on the roof repairs and maintenance work which were successfully undertaken in October, and mentioned that we also had a detailed roof inspection, which, unfortunately, identified further maintenance works. For the inspection, the steeplejacks used a drone to take high resolution photographs of the roof. These were amazing to look at – they allowed us to see almost every single slate on the roof. If we really wanted to, we could count them all!

Much of the further maintenance work required is urgent. The report identified a number of issues, including missing slates and, at the interface between the slates and the gable coping stones, missing or loose skews (the mortar fillet that keeps water away from the wall). It also highlighted that the pointing between many of our coping stones is either partly or fully missing. Essentially, water is almost certainly penetrating our building and we need to repair these gaps urgently to prevent further deterioration.

The report also highlighted potential safety issues, including where the mortar skews have broken up and are loose, meaning they could possibly fall off the roof.

To address these safety issues whilst awaiting the full repair, we have regrettably had to close off access to the south side of the church grounds (the garden area used by the Preschool). On the north side we stopped access along the pathway between the north-west stairwell door and north-east door (under the archway). As this had significant impact on access to the north-west door, the steeplejacks recommended installing high level suspended scaffolding to avoid the risk of falling objects. We agreed to this on the two north gables, and the work has recently been completed. As well as providing fall protection, this scaffolding may also help to provide access while the permanent repairs are taking place. The cost of using the scaffolding is approximately £4,600 for 12 weeks.

As the cost of the permanent repairs is therefore anticipated to be greater than £20,000, we had to seek approval from Presbytery of Glasgow. They approved our application in December. To comply with their rules we must seek at least three quotations, which we are in the process of getting; we hope to be able to appoint a contractor soon.

The financing of any major project is always important. The Kirk Session have agreed that these works should be primarily funded from our reserves, in particular from the surplus from last year's purchase of a new manse. Nonetheless, we have also applied for grants. So far, we have been awarded £5,000 from the Baird Trust, which will make a significant contribution towards this project, and we should also be able to reclaim the VAT from the

Listed Places of Worship Grant Scheme. If anyone would like to contribute directly to these repairs, please contact the Church Treasurer. *(See page 13 and page 21)*

'FOR I KNOW THE PLANS I HAVE FOR YOU...' JEREMIAH 29:11

When I graduated as a teacher, I truly thought my student days were over. But, God, of course, had plans for me! Before the summer months in 2021, I read about a short Glasgow University course in the church email. It was called Developing and Leading Christian Worship. I thought that it looked really interesting and stimulating.

The course sounded great for me as I could access in-person classes via Zoom in a hybrid classroom, meaning I could join the live in-person evening class via my computer. The course would be spread over four months and there would be assessment at the end, but it was not compulsory. Things were just getting better and better!

So, in September, I became a student again. When I zoomed, I saw some familiar faces on the course but also some new faces including someone from Colonsay and others from Iona and Arran. The rest of us were from the Central Belt and mainly represented the Church of Scotland. There was homework every week and preparation to be done for the next session, including essential reading, watching videos and listening to lectures. Some of the topics covered were – Centring Worship around the Bible; All-age Worship; Music in Worship (which was of particular interest to me) and Leading with Words, Presence and Posture. All in all, this was a thought-provoking and challenging course.

By week 8, we were asked to plan and prepare a service of worship which we would lead. We were not expected to preach a sermon, but we could if we particularly wanted to. I would like to thank Neil for being so willing to allow me to lead our first Sunday in Advent service and for acting out a scenario which I had contrived!

This time last year, I wouldn't have believed that I would do a university course on Zoom, never mind lead part of a service. As we enter this new year, it is comforting to know that God has our future in his hands and knows what's best for us. All we have to do is 'Let go and let God'.

I began by quoting part of a famous verse from Jeremiah; now I'll quote it in full. May these words be an encouragement for us all, as we travel through the year:

''For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." Jeremiah 29:11

Q AND A - WHAT IS AN ECO-CONGREGATION?



Q. Perhaps you already knew that Stonelaw Church is now an Eco-Congregation, but what does that mean?

A. It simply means that we've joined over 500 Scottish churches from Shetland to Dumfries and Galloway, in registering as an ecocongregation. Neil and the Kirk Session took this decision as our first step towards becoming a more eco-friendly church.

Q. What is Eco-Congregation Scotland?

LETTER FROM THE TREASURER

Happy New Year, everyone! Apologies that this update is slightly briefer than usual and does not include the usual table.

I have thrown myself headlong into the task of putting together the annual accounts, which takes up the majority of my attention in this role at the start of the year. Therefore I hope you'll forgive me if I give you the headlines now, and fill in the details at a later date.

The good and the bad news is that our financial position has not changed significantly from the position Stuart and I outlined in early December. The General Fund made a small surplus in 2021, which was particularly pleasing as it was achieved without an appeal to the congregation. Replacing the old Manse significantly increased the reserves held to address both Fabric issues generally and the ongoing roof issues, as explained by Stuart.

However, the news is not all good. As you'll be aware, in 2020 the General Fund suffered a significant shortfall - and while the surplus in 2021 is obviously welcome, it has not made up for the 2020 shortfall. 2022 also looks likely to present many challenges. These include a significantly higher Church of Scotland Ministry and Mission allocation, in addition to the higher costs everyone is facing. On the other hand, the prospect of a year with fewer restrictions does offer the chance to meet some of these challenges without making appeals to the congregation.

As always, I would like to sign off by thanking the congregation for their support and generosity - whether in time, talent or money.

MEET ASIF AND HEAR ABOUT OPERATION PHILIP



In Hebrews 13:3, Paul wrote, 'Continue to remember those in prison as if you were together with them in prison, and those who are mistreated as if you yourselves were suffering'. (NIV)

It is estimated that more than 300 million Christians around the world are persecuted and oppressed simply because of their

faith. Often, they are treated as second-class citizens and have to endure harassment in law and education as well as being denied access to services and employment. Please pray for our brothers and sisters who suffer terribly at the hands of dictators and governments in places like Uganda, Afghanistan and North Korea.

At the end of November 2021, Release, an organisation which supports persecuted Christians held its annual National Volunteering Conference on zoom. Partners, Hugh and Barbara (their full identity was not revealed) told us about their work in Central Asia, using broadcasting ministry to spread the gospel and strengthen the church. The whole experience gave me an insight into the real danger that workers like Hugh and Barbara face daily.

Later there were interviews with volunteers from Northern Ireland and Scotland (me!) to help encourage others to volunteer for Release in the own churches.

This month you can hear first-hand about Asif and his project, Operation Philip, which rescues Christians whose lives are in immediate danger, due to persecution.

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MOTHERS SUPPORTING MOTHERS AND CHILDREN IN SOUTH SUDAN



Mother-of-five Achoya, says the majority of pregnant mothers in her area did not have much knowledge about healthy eating. But that was before she and other mums like her took action, alongside Christian Aid's local partner in South Sudan.

The climate crisis, conflict and isolation have made diets very limited, and malnutrition rates high, in her area. Yet there are solutions, and Achoya, who trained to be a health facilitator with one of our local partners, is helping to implement one of them. She supports Mother to Mother groups and shares information about nutrition and the importance of breastfeeding. The group members then help to spread this knowledge to other mums.

Achoya also promotes good hygiene, which has meant more mums are delivering their babies safely in health facilities – and more newborns can be checked for malnutrition.
