MESSAGE AND PRAYER FROM NEIL



Dear Friends

I always used to laugh when people said that time would pass quicker the older you got. However, I must be getting older because it seems like no time at all since I was preparing myself for another run-up to Christmas. Yet by the time you are reading this, we will be very much in Advent. Advent is all about making room and getting ourselves ready to celebrate

the coming of Jesus, God with us, and it is important that we prepare ourselves well. Indeed, this idea of making room for Jesus will be the theme of our Advent sermon series, and is from the well-known opening to chapter 2 of Luke's Gospel:

At that time Emperor Augustus ordered a census to be taken throughout the Roman Empire. When this first census took place, Quirinius was the governor of Syria. Everyone, then, went to register himself, each to his own hometown.

Joseph went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to the town of Bethlehem in Judea, the birthplace of King David. Joseph went there because he was a descendant of David. He went to register with Mary, who was promised in marriage to him. She was pregnant, and while they were in Bethlehem, the time came for her to have her baby. She gave birth to her first son, wrapped him in cloths and laid him in a manger there was no room for them to stay in the inn.

Luke 2:1-7 (Good News Translation)

It seems so silly to think that we would struggle to allow room for the One who was willing to go to the Cross on our behalf, offering us this magnificent gift of eternal life, yet that is what we do! There are so many things looking to divert our attention away or take up space in our lives, that it can be difficult to ensure we have room for Jesus.

I hope you get to spend some time during Advent to reflect on this and I also hope you find yourself able to answer the question Jesus poses: "May I come into your life and stay with you always?" with a resounding "Yes" once again!

May you have a wonder-filled Christmas when it comes.

We are your people, walking in darkness, yet seeking the light.

To you we say, "Come Lord Jesus!"

Unfortunately, during heavy rain in October, two new roof leaks appeared. Since then, the leaks appear to have stopped so it seems likely they were intermittent leaks, dependent on the intensity and direction of rain. Quotations for the repair of these leaks will be sought.

Defibrillator battery replacement

Did you hear the defibrillator beeping in early October? The battery had to be replaced. The cost, at £318, is because it needs a specialist long-life battery that is guaranteed for 4 years.

At the end of September our main electricity meter was upgraded to a smart meter - so no more estimated bills!



2022 CONGREGATIONAL CONFERENCE REPORT

BACKGROUND

We met for our first Congregational Conference in my time here on Saturday 18th June 2022. This was an opportunity to gather over breakfast and come up with ideas on how we might best operate a ministry within our Cluster. We were aiming to find ways to cover the 5 Marks of Mission which have been adopted by the Church of Scotland.

REPORT

Conversations round the tables seemed to be flowing very well and there was a good number of responses in each of the areas of the 5 Marks of Mission. *(Ed: a summary of these will be included in the next magazine.)* The area with the most responses, however, was in the arena of loving kindness, which is a wonderful reminder that we have a congregation that wishes to reach out to people with the love of Jesus.

Like most endeavours of this nature, there were clearly overlaps in thinking. Several ideas seemed to resonate with most groups, which shows that we are being prompted in the same direction - also a good thing. One is that we need to become less minister-centric, or minister-focussed, which I am completely in favour of as I believe this will be imperative to our moving forward within a new Church of Scotland with fewer ministers. Those we have will need to be freed up to do the things they are ordained to do, no doubt taking on more Presbytery and National Church work, as we seek to equip congregations to reach out to the parishes with the Good News of Jesus.

I hope this gives you all encouragement and food for thought as we continue our journey towards having a whole-church approach to mission.

NEXT STEPS

The responses from the Conference will, in the first instance, help the Kirk Session in plotting out a missional map over the coming months and years. While some things may be quite easy to explore and implement, others might take a bit more time. I look forward to further opportunities to gather as a congregation in 2023 and will welcome further ideas.

CLIMATE, CHURCH & CHANGE CONFERENCE IN STONELAW CHURCH

Saturday 5th November marked a year since the very soggy COP26 Mass Mobilisation March in which CoSY (Church of Scotland Youth) Glasgow members took part. One year later, we wanted to see what had been achieved by the church and to allow the voices of young people to be heard by Presbytery and by the national church on the topic of climate change. That's why we decided to host our conference.

Thanks to a lot of planning and help from many people, the conference was a great success - and much drier and warmer than the march had been! The Presbytery Moderator, Rev Hilary McDougall, led our opening worship.

Our conference focussed on how small changes can make a big difference. Clare Flenley from the Church of Scotland's Net Zero group spoke to us about changes the Church of Scotland is already making at a national level and what individual congregations around the country are doing. Rev David Coleman and Stephen Curran from Eco-congregation Scotland spoke to us about how both the Church of Scotland and the Scottish Government aim to achieve Net Zero carbon emissions; our church by 2030 and Scotland by 2045.

We discussed what steps we can take individually and as congregations to work towards this. Ross Greer, Scottish Greens MSP for West Scotland spoke to us about how we can talk to MSPs & MPs to get our voices heard in decision-making and Karen Wallace ran a workshop about making our voices heard at different levels within the church.

Our turnout, sadly, was lower than we had hoped but everyone who attended had a good time and hopefully went away inspired and motivated to make changes in their own churches. We collected notes from all attendees on how they think their voices can be heard and also what they would like to try in their own churches to reduce their carbon footprint, work towards net zero and help to protect the environment. CoSY plans to meet up again soon, to look through these and then work with those who attended to support them in making the changes they have suggested.

CoSY would like to thank Stonelaw Church for allowing us to use their space for the conference and also for the gifts of amazing home baking that helped us through the day.

WHAT IS COSY?

CoSY stands for Church of Scotland Youth. The Glasgow group is run with the support of Karen Wallace, who works for the Presbytery of Glasgow. CoSY Glasgow is open to anyone aged 18-25 and we meet about once a month in the city centre. Our activities vary. Recently we have been organising this conference, but normally we have a mixture of meeting types. Over the last year our topic has been caring for creation. We have had a variety of activities and Bible studies related to this (including the very rainy walk mentioned at the start!) We have also had social meetups over the last year, including quizzes, escape rooms – and we always have lots of sweets, food and a good chat.

For the first time, we experimented with Karaoke. Without doubt, the star of the show was Dennis, who brought many to tears with a wonderful rendition of 'My Way'. Dennis has sight problems so isn't able to read the words on the screen, however, that didn't matter as he was word perfect.

We also had a first visit from the Stonelaw Pre-School Group. Two children and two of the leaders joined us for afternoon tea and then encouraged us to join them in singing (with actions!) 'Row, Row, Row the Boat'. We were also delighted to welcome again two nurses from the Older People's Mental Health Team at Eastvale.

November Meetings

It was lovely to have Margaret Borland and Dorothy McTaggart lead us again in singing many old favourites. Both ladies were brilliant, albeit they ended up a wee bit wabbit after a long rendition of 'Old MacDonald had a farm!' We were also joined by Debbie McDougall, a physio who attends Maxwell Mearns Church. Debbie took us through a series of easy but helpful chair exercises. Everyone found this surprisingly enjoyable!

Lindsay Murdoch, Alzheimer Scotland's Dementia Adviser for Scotland attends Past Times meetings to help our visitors with advice etc. Alzheimer Scotland was given funding from the Scottish Government to support carers and Lindsay was authorised to provide our carers with an 'Afternoon Tea'. This event was on Wednesday 23rd November. A local company provided the food and Past Times volunteers were on hand to serve tea etc. It was a lovely time - so good to see everyone enjoying their Afternoon Tea.

Looking Ahead

We know how much our visitors value their time with us in Past Times. However, it is only a very small respite from their normal life at home and so we are going to have one additional meeting each month; the Past Times Drop-in Café. We will open the Café @ the Meeting Place on the fourth Wednesday afternoon of the month for the sole use of Past Times visitors. We hope that they will all enjoy the opportunity to form relationships with one another in this relaxed atmosphere.

Those of us who attended the Service of Thanksgiving for Margo were delighted to hear from Neil and Grant about all the family adventures in which Margo was more than a willing participant. From climbing Munros (including Ben Lawers when Grant was only 4) to a road trip to Yugoslavia when it was still behind the Iron Curtain. The following few years saw the family embark on a series of European road trips seeing them visit more than a dozen different countries – from Norway to Italy and the South of France – all in the days long before the Spanish package holiday was even a thing.

Road trips were superseded by trips on family friend (and previous member of Stonelaw) David Jamieson's various boats. Well into their 70s, Margo and Peter were still heading off on planes, trains and automobiles for weeks at a time to join David in voyages as far flung as northern Norway, the Swedish islands and Finland. By her own admission, Margo was little versed in the technicalities of sailing or the intricacies of navigation but she employed her creative skills in producing spray hoods, cushion covers, sails and other boat-related items as required.

Margo had indeed an adventurous spirit, which belied her quietly spoken persona. An inspiration indeed!

MRS EUNICE BAIRD 1926-2022



Eunice Baird was born on the 27th September 1926, and grew up in Broomhill, Glasgow. After sitting her Highers in March 1944, she volunteered for the Woman's Royal Naval Service (WRNS) and arrived at Bletchley Park seven days before the D Day Landings took place. Her duties included passing on messages from the beaches in Normandy, between her Section and Hut No.6. She later realised that this was the hut where the decoding of the Enigma machines was done. After the war until she was demobbed in August 1946, Eunice was mostly involved in driving vehicles such as three-ton trucks, and ferrying pilots to and from their aircraft. She was in her element, as she loved driving.

Next, Eunice attended college in Glasgow to learn shorthand and typing and she held secretarial positions in Glasgow until in 1954 she sailed to Cape Town to marry a Glaswegian banker, William Baird. Eunice then held

several secretarial jobs in Salisbury, (now known as Harare) until the arrival of her son Richard in 1956. The family moved to Ndola in what is now Zambia but in 1960 returned to Glasgow. Sadly, the marriage eventually broke down and ended in divorce.

From 1964 until her retirement in 1991, Eunice worked in civilian roles within the City of Glasgow Police: in the CID Criminal Intelligence Section, running the Typing Pool and eventually, as Secretary to the Commandant of the Police Training School. She always spoke with enthusiasm about her career in the Police.

Eunice was a devoted mother and grandmother who took a great interest in the lives and careers of her Yorkshire grandchildren: Meaghan, Callum, Lauren and Euan. She enjoyed remarkably good health until falling ill in August.

Cathie Gray has kindly added a few words about her friendship with Eunice:

I've known Eunice for 38 to 40 years, ever since I was moved to the Strathclyde Police Force Training Centre in Oxford Street, Glasgow. We soon discovered that we both lived in Rutherglen and were members of Stonelaw Church. We often discussed things that were happening in the Church and different people we knew. She was always interested in what was going on in Stonelaw. Eunice was a very private person who loved coming to Church on a Sunday morning and it was only latterly that she missed some Sundays due to the weather; she didn't attend if it was windy or raining. To my knowledge she didn't get involved in any groups but did come to some coffee mornings. She was very friendly with the late Alan Molloy and had some great discussions with him. In fact, I know Eunice used to type out Alan's sermons for him when he was leading the services in Stonelaw.

Eunice and I took turns to host afternoon coffee. She was a lovely lady and I will miss her very much.

"SLEEPING GIANT" BY REV TOMMY MCNEIL

On 7th November, a number of us were part of a packed house at St George's Tron Church in Glasgow, to hear Rev Tommy McNeil from Martin's Memorial Church in Stornoway speaking about his new book: "Sleeping Giant".

This is an easy-to-read book and an encouraging look at the Church of Scotland, which he describes as a giant which has great potential and is just waiting to be re-awakened.

The introduction draws on the story of the dry bones in Ezekiel 37, to give the reader a picture of the great potential within our church. If only

we would stop saying "The Church is dead" and keep trying to do things our own way. We should put our trust in God alone and seek what he would wish for us instead of following our own desires.

In the last chapter of his book, Tommy uses the story in Luke 8:40-56 of Jairus and his daughter to illustrate the kind of faith we should have to awaken our church. He highlights the great faith of Jairus (a leader in the synagogue) and the patience he was obliged to show when Jesus was:

- firstly, side-tracked into helping the woman who suffered from severe bleeding
- then by the people who laughed at Jesus when he commented that Jairus's daughter was only sleeping
- and finally, by the people who had gathered to moan and wail whom he removed from the house before raising her to life.

Tommy likens these distractions to those we find when we try to run our church without God.

"The Sleeping Giant" is a great read and at £9.00 is worth buying or downloading.

The House Group which meets at Jennifer Menzies' home (on the first Thursday morning of each month at 10.30 am) has decided to cover each one of the 11 chapters as a study. Why not come along – you would be most welcome.

Pastor Wang Yi from China has been sentenced to 9 years imprisonment since 2018.

Zafar Bhatti from Pakistan has been sentenced to an unknown amount of time since 2012

Pastor Kim Kuk-Gi from North Korea has been sentenced to life imprisonment since 2014.



Mussie Ezaz from Eritrea has been sentenced for an indefinite period since 2007.

These are real people with real stories. They are only four of our many Christian brothers and sisters who are imprisoned for their faith. You can read their profiles and those of other prisoners on Release International's website at <u>www.releaseinternational.org/prisoners-of-faith</u> The stories on the website are astounding – they have to be read to be believed!

On Sunday 6th November, Stonelaw Church marked the **International Day of Prayer for the Persecuted Church (IDOP)**. As a congregation, we watched a video which introduced IDOP and highlighted several countries where Christians are being imprisoned because of their faith. Our reading was from Hebrews 13:1-3 which includes the passage on which Release International bases their ministry:

Continue to remember those in prison as if you were together with them in prison, and those who are mistreated as if you yourselves were suffering. Hebrews 13:1-3.

Neil's sermon focused on remembering our persecuted brothers and sisters, while most of our prayer time was dedicated to praying for Christians who have been kidnapped, tortured, imprisoned or murdered for their faith. It was extremely beneficial to highlight real situations and be made aware of situations faced by persecuted families.

By the time many of you read this magazine, a coffee morning to raise funds for Release will have taken place on Saturday 3rd December. In particular, the charity would like to thank Keir Baird, who had the original idea of holding an event to raise money for Release. He was so touched by what James Fraser (Release's Scottish Lead Engagement Manager) said at our service in August, that he felt moved to do something which would involve lots of people. If you didn't manage to make the coffee morning, it is not too late to donate to Release.
