Letter from our Locum Minister

As I consider this recent epoch, I believe there will be many like me, who have found new things to do, and for whom time is passing quickly. Yet, I'm equally certain that there are those for whom this period has seemed interminable. Isolation can be a great burden if every day seems to drag on, which reminds me, as I now remind you, that we need to keep looking out for others: our family members, neighbours and church members. We must weep with those who weep.

That brings me to the reason I have left my house most often in recent weeks - not for exercise, but to conduct funerals, none caused by Covid-19. Funerals, at present, are even more difficult for the bereaved than usual. People are not simply bereft of a loved one, but also of the physical touch and presence of those who would normally be around them.

What comfort there is, therefore, for those who belong to God in Jesus Christ! For we are assured that He will never leave us, nor forsake us; that nothing in all creation shall separate us from His love; and that underneath are the everlasting arms of God to hold us in comfort.

The Christian poet and hymn writer Annie Johnson Flint expresses the great care that God has for each of us in her poem "He Giveth More Grace". The language is now dated, but the truth is unchanging. For more about Annie Johnson Flint, see page 25.

He giveth more grace when the burdens grow greater,

He sendeth more strength when the labours increase;

To added affliction He addeth His mercy, To multiplied trials, His multiplied peace.

When we have exhausted our store of endurance.

From our Interim Moderator

Dear friends,

We are so grateful for the on-going ministries of John Martindale and Thérèse Reid in these difficult times. Sunday worship by Zoom has been a blessing to many. If you need assistance in accessing this worship, please contact an office bearer who will endeavour to find assistance for you. A telephone ministry has also been put in place for those who have no Internet or Smartphone access.

As I write, the Scottish Government indicates a possible relaxation of some lockdown measures by 28th May. Unfortunately, there is no mention of church gatherings. We have to assume that our buildings will remain closed as we approach summer.

Currently, Council Registrars are not accepting applications for marriages, and funerals are taking longer than normal to administer. To minimize Covid-19 risk, funeral services are only permitted at gravesides and crematoria and may only be attended by immediate family. Almost unbearably, social distancing rules remain in place for all in attendance. I am so sorry to say that preparations for a funeral service may have to be undertaken by phone or by a video-conferencing mechanism.

Please pray especially for those who grieve in such difficult circumstances.

I have been meeting with the Kirk Session on the 1st Tuesday of each month by Zoom. They continue to serve you diligently and pray for you. We continue working on matters pertaining to the vacancy; especially the congregational roll, the manse and a parish profile. Unfortunately, lockdown has stymied the completion of the electoral roll and the appointment of a Nominating Committee. We are not halted, but certainly slowed down.

Please pray for the fulfilling of the Lord's will and timing as we continue this search for a new minister at Stonelaw.

In Romans 8.18-30 we are reminded of the sovereignty of God even as the world groans in frustrated fallenness. We ourselves groan with the rest of creation. But God really is sovereign; God's Holy Spirit really dwells in all who believe in Jesus. He not only upholds and sanctifies us at this time but also prays with us and for us!

Let us renew our faith in Christ at this time, setting aside regular times for Bible reading and prayer. I assure you of my prayers and that of your brothers and sisters in Christ at Maxwell Mearns Castle Church

Congregational Email 30th May 2020

As lockdown restrictions begin to ease and a golf season of sorts begins, Dorothy and I have been chatting about how we've spent all this time at home. Thankfully the weather has been wonderful so there's been lots of DIY and gardening outdoors. We've also been reading more and I've rediscovered John Stott's compact book "The Living Church". As this is Pentecost, the birth of the church, I've turned to it again.

After eight wonderful chapters about the church, the author has written a conclusion entitled "Looking for Timothys". As Session meets on Tuesday to consider what kind of minister we are looking for, please allow me briefly to share Stott's advice.

He makes a threefold appeal to ministers: to be ethical, doctrinal and experiential. Ethically, ministers are to run for their lives, running away from evil (2 Timothy 2:22) and running after righteousness. Secondly the doctrinal appeal, to fight the good fight of the faith (1 Timothy 6:20). Ministers are to run away from doctrinal error and fight for the truth of God's word. Lastly the experiential appeal, to take hold, personally, of the life eternal to which they were called. And what is eternal life?

Jesus answered "Now this is eternal life, that we may know You, the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom You have sent (John 17:3).

Stott's balanced appeal is for ministers who are equally committed to what is true, what is good and what is real. May this be our prayer for our new minister, praying also for our elders' meeting on Tuesday.

Readers may recall that a Church of Scotland Edict was read out in worship recently, over two Sundays. This Edict notified us that in connection with the vacancy, the Kirk Session, as required by church law, would discuss and vote on ACT 1 2015, which pertains to Ministers in Civil Partnerships and Same-Sex Marriages. Our Interim Moderator, Rev Dr Scott Kirkland, has asked us to communicate the following outcome.

At the Kirk Session meeting on Tuesday 5th May, in connection with the search for a new minister, the Session voted to remain with the current and historic position of the Church of Scotland in regard to human sexuality. As a consequence, the matter is now concluded and shall play no further part in the ongoing process of vacancy.

CHALLENGE

How best can we respond to the needs of our community once Lockdown is lifted, and how best can we continue to be a Church Without Walls? Can I invite you please to begin prayerfully to consider these questions?

CHURCH DOORS LOCKED, GATES CHAINED - IS THERE ANYONE THERE? In March, when our church doors were locked, the gates chained, I was concerned about what this would say to our community. As Easter approached, my concerns

heightened. I spoke with Jennifer Menzies; we threw around some ideas, and Jennifer and her boys created a beautiful banner proclaiming "He is Risen."

BANNERS OF HOPE

This gave me the idea of "Banners of Hope." I approached Shona Beckwith and Marlyn Latta with the idea of each creating a banner of hope, using their own unique artistic gifts. I then offered the idea to our children and their families, and some of them are planning to create one too. We are using the backs of various banners we already have in the church for Holiday Club etc. so there is no financial outlay involved. Our idea is to rotate these during lockdown, keeping a fresh, live, relevant message to the community:that we are here, and that we care.

We also have a Prayer Railing. The banner reads,

If there is someone or something you wish to pray for or about in this time of uncertainty, please feel free to tie a ribbon to our railing and spend a moment in prayer (please bring your own ribbon)

Letter from the Treasurer

It is now eight weeks since I wrote to the congregation on the financial impacts of Covid-19. You may recall that I detailed how approximately 30% of our income comes through the offering plate and that, without Sunday services, this income stream has dried up. As we are all aware, it looks as if it is going to be some considerable time until we can resume our normal services. Furthermore, with our café on hold, the surpluses we have benefitted from in previous years (£4,000 in 2019 transferred to our General Fund) will, almost certainly, not be realised this year. With other church activities such as the Toddlers unable to meet, further donations from those groups are also unlikely to be made.

As we have now had a full calendar month of the restrictions imposed to limit the spread of the virus, I am able to update you on the financial impact on Stonelaw Parish Church so far.

While, unfortunately, I do not have good news to share, I would like to start by thanking the many in the congregation who have taken the time in the last few weeks and months to set up standing orders. While the future is uncertain, the current position would be much worse had you not done this, so I think it is important, on behalf of the rest of the congregation, to express our sincere gratitude to you.

However, I have to advise you that we have still seen a significant drop in donations in April compared to previous months. If this fall were to be sustained over the rest of the year, our estimates suggest that the General Fund would be completely depleted before the end of the year.

I appreciate that this is a difficult time for many and that there will be those in the congregation who are on furlough and/or have uncertainty over their job or business and it may be that we simply cannot make up the shortfall through donations. As a result I am taking the step of contacting the Church of Scotland finance team to make them aware that it is possible that we may need to defer part of our Ministry and Mission contribution - and to ask that our current circumstances be taken into account when next year's contribution is calculated.

This would obviously be a drastic course of action which we should look to avoid if we possibly can. Many other churches are likely to be in a similar position, and if they do

the same, this may seriously impact the work of the wider church. In order to avoid this, I would like to outline the ways in which donations can be made to the Church.

Standing order or online banking.

Either a one-off payment or standing order can be set up using online banking. For those who use online banking, our bank details are:

If you wish to set up a standing order but do not have access to or prefer not to use internet banking, a Standing Order form (to send to your bank) can be found on our website at :http://stonelawchurch.org/giving.

If you set up a standing order, please remember you are able to cancel this at any time.

Posting a cheque

We are able to accept donations by cheque. These should be made out to Stonelaw Parish Church and posted to our Free Will Offering treasurer:

Text donation service

We have set up a text donation service to allow donations by text for those who are not able to use online banking or cheques. To use this service text **STONELAWCH** followed by the number of pounds you wish to donate e.g. **STONELAWCH 5** to donate £5. If you use this service we will not keep a record of your phone number or use it to contact you for any reason.

While my main aim in writing is to reach those whose normal way of giving offerings has been interrupted, I am aware that there will be some of you who are fortunate enough to be in a position that would allow you to increase your donation to the Church. If this is the case then I would ask that you give this your prayerful consideration.

Finally, no message from the Treasurer would be complete without a reminder about Gift Aid. If you are a UK taxpayer, donating through the Gift Aid scheme means that we are able to claim back 25 pence for every £1 that you give - without giving anything extra. If you would like to give using the Gift Aid scheme, you will need to complete a declaration form (also on http://stonelawchurch.org/giving) which should be completed and returned to Iain Morrison as the Freewill Offering Treasurer (Flat G/L, 5 Parkhill Drive, Rutherglen, G73 2PJ). If possible, please keep Iain updated with any changes, either to the way you give, or the amount, so that he can keep his records accurately.

I trust you will give this matter your prayerful consideration.

Tributes to Stonelaw members who have died in April and May

Rev John Martindale, Rev Dr Scott Kirkland and David McTaggart have all mentioned the great sadness of having to deal with the loss of a family member during these difficult times of social distancing and lockdown. As a congregation we are sad too, that we cannot attend the funerals of church family members. For this reason, we have included the following tributes. Many thanks to all who helped with the writing.

Kay Kellock 1926-2020

We were all very sad to hear of the death of Kay Kellock at the age of 94. Kay grew up in the West End of Glasgow where she attended Hillhead High School. She came to live in Parkhill Drive, Rutherglen when she married her husband Bobby. Bobby worked for British Steel but died when still a young man, in a road accident, leaving Kay with three children: Lynn, Neil and Stewart. She then went back to teaching and moved to nearby Balvaird Crescent, where she lived for the rest of her life.

Kay was an enthusiastic and very committed primary school teacher, first at Spittal Primary and then at Burnside Primary, where she taught many of our congregation, including our previous minister, Alistair May, Douglas Shaw, Shona Murray, Jackie and Leigh Coia, Stuart and Andrew Molloy, Lois and Kenny Baillie, Craig Neil and Graham and Derek Baird.

Kay was a much loved member of our Stonelaw family, and devoted a large part of her life to serving the church. Her main interest was the Women's Guild in which she served as President and then Secretary for many years, as well as being Convenor on various committees.

After Kay retired she became involved with the Toddlers Group and loved welcoming the children. She also delivered Meals on Wheels for many years, and became an enthusiastic member of Templeton's Bowling Club. With her close friends: Betty Shields, Ena Murray and Jean Walker, she enjoyed many bus tours, and trips to the Pitlochry Theatre. Kay was a lovely lady, always with a welcoming smile.

Bill Stark 1941-2020

Bill, who died on 19th April aged 79, was born on 17th February 1941 to Jean and Tom Stark and was brought up in Bankhead, Rutherglen with his siblings Ian, Marion and David. He attended Bankhead Primary School until the age of nine.

As his mother thought he was developing an "unfortunate" accent, she sent him to elocution lessons, much to his dismay, as he would have preferred to be playing football with his pals. At nine he moved to Hutchesons' Grammar School, where he was told by one of his teachers that if he knew his lessons as well as he knew the football results, he would do fine.

At the age of 15 the family moved from Bankhead to Thorntonhall. Bill hated being taken away from his pals but Chris Kinnear who was in his class at Hutchie cycled up to Thorntonhall one day to say hello and introduced him eventually to the boys from Busby. One of these was Jim Kerr and thus began a friendship between the three boys that lasted a lifetime.

When Bill was 16, his father became ill and he had to leave school to take over the running of the family business, Gilchrist's the Grain Store on Rutherglen Main Street. Bill was a great innovator and brought about many changes to the business over the years, eventually selling fresh flowers. He continued to work there with his brother lan until the shop was sold in 1990.

Bill met Margaret at Busby East Church when they were both 21. Three years later the young couple married, on September 1st 1965, at Busby East Church. The couple set up home in Underwood Road, which was within walking distance to the shop on Main Street. After two years Bill and Margaret were blessed with the arrival of a daughter, Jane, and two years later with the birth of their son, Allan. In 1978 the family moved to Victoria Road.

Margaret & Bill became members of Stonelaw Church shortly after Jane was born. In Tom Morton's days, Bill joined the church drama group, which he loved. He got to know people of all ages there, making many special friends.

Bill also became a Manager in Stonelaw, helping with the fabric and finance of the church. In 2004 Bill, along with Ann McLintock, Bob Wilson and George Morrison, had a vision for Stonelaw to be an "Open Church." They also had a heart to support the work of Fair Trade and so began a Fair Trade stall which ran for many years. At that time, many congregations had a Fair Trade stall on Sundays, selling to church members, but this group had the vision to open the church doors two days a week to what was then the Hall of Fellowship, now the Meeting Place - and invite the whole community to participate. They had no idea whether the idea would work, but stepped out anyway. Thanks to their vision, sixteen years on, the church doors are still open, not two but six days a week, and although we no longer have a Fair Trade stall, we continue to serve Fair Trade tea, coffee and biscuits, serve our community, and give financial support to the essential work of Fair Trade.

Bill loved the beauty of creation, especially flowers. After moving into their flat on Greystone Avenue, Bill loved working in Margaret's mother's garden. He also took great pleasure in providing, along with John Shaw, a colourful array of flowers in tubs and baskets, always fresh, ever changing to adorn the front doors of our church on Stonelaw Road.

Bill Stark was a good and loyal friend; he loved people; he cared. He was a good, loving, hard working husband, father and grandfather whose family came first. Bill was and always will be deeply loved, and happy memories will be forever treasured.

Bette Barclay 1918-2020

Bette was born Elizabeth Dickie Cockburn on 16th January 1918 in MacDonald Street, Rutherglen and baptised in Stonelaw Church by Rev Thomas Wardrop. Her mother's family had been members of the United Presbyterian congregation in King Street, which founded Stonelaw in 1912. Bette attended Sunday School and the Girls' Guildry, enjoying many summer camps.

After school, she worked in Templeton's Carpets at Bridgeton as a quality-control inspector. When war broke out in 1939, Bette volunteered for the Land Army and spent happy years working on a farm in Castle Douglas with a family who treated her like a

daughter. She loved driving the tractor, working with Clydesdale horses and had a great love of animals.

Bette's faith was always important to her, so it is not surprising that she met Jimmy Barclay at the Tent Hall in Steel Street, Calton just off Glasgow Green. They were married in 1944 by the Rev. Archie Watt in the Ca' d'Oro building in Glasgow. The young couple started married life in a flat in the same building where her parents stayed, in MacDonald Street.

Their first child Margaret arrived at the height of a great snowfall and their second, Moira, was born five years later. The family moved first to Fernhill in 1961 and then to Upper Bourtree Drive in 1974. Millport was a favourite venue for summer holidays; the family have very fond memories of happy times there.

In 1965, Margaret took off for a job in Canada, and apart from a short spell home in 1972-75, has been in Toronto ever since. This allowed Bette to visit Canada, and she looked forward every year to Margaret's Christmas visit home.

Bette's faith, and her need to be part of the church family, were strong. Her long association with Rodger's Evangelical Institute, Rutherglen, as well as the Glasgow Tent Hall, meant that her knowledge of old hymn tunes was good. She was a member of Stonelaw's Junior Choir, and a strong alto in the Stonelaw Singers, under the leadership of Elizabeth Scott.

Bette was the practical person in the house. She would repair anything that broke down, and was a great baker, knitter, dressmaker, painter and decorator. At the age of 88 she took her first trip to Europe with John and Moira in their caravan, visiting France, Belgium, Luxembourg and Germany.

Sadly, Vascular Dementia began to impinge on Bette's life, and after a bad fall down the stairs in 2011, she was admitted to Abbeyfield and then to Rodger Park, where staff looked after her in a very caring way. The illness meant that it was often difficult to make contact with her, but from time to time she would burst into song and sing every verse of a hymn word-perfect, to the great amusement and amazement of the staff.

For her 100th Birthday Bette was sent a telegram from the Queen, and the staff in the Home gave her a party. The next day *The Saints* folk music group, of which John was a member, provided tunes for many patients in Rodger Park units to listen, sing along, and even dance to.

Because the end of Bette's life came during the Covid-19 pandemic, only the Rev John Martindale, Moira and John were permitted to attend the service, but memories of her long active life will remain with everyone who knew her.

Greta Doig 1933-2020

We were all very sad to hear of Greta's death on 13th May, just a few days short of her 87th birthday, after a lifetime of Christian service to Stonelaw Church.

Greta Forrester was born on 17th May 1933. She and her brother Ewing grew up at the far end of Kings Park Avenue, walking to Stonelaw Church every Sunday with their parents. Her grandparents had been Stonelaw members too. The family spent many happy caravan holidays in St Andrews.

Greta attended Glasgow High School and then trained as a physiotherapist at the Victoria Infirmary, where she was based for her whole career. Part of her role involved sessions at Rutherglen Maternity Hospital, and Stonelaw's young mothers whom she visited there greatly appreciated her kindness.

Greta and Malcolm met at a 21st birthday party on the Carrick in January 1955. They became engaged during a Watchnight Service in Stonelaw Church and married there on 1st September 1960, soon welcoming their sons Colin and David into the family. and eventually, Colin's wife Seonaid, David's wife Elspeth and five much loved grandchildren. The Forrester tradition of holidays in St Andrews continued as the family expanded, and in 1998, Greta and Malcolm bought a house there, which they have visited regularly ever since. With support from the family, they even managed, only a few months ago, to see in the New Year there together.

For many years Greta was a committed elder, representing our church along with her husband, Malcolm, at Glasgow Presbytery. She was a very enthusiastic Guild member and served two terms as our Guild President. She also served on the south-east council and became National Vice President. She was Chair of the Scottish Bible Society who deliver Bibles worldwide, and UK President of the National Council of Churches. Nearer home, Greta helped to organise The World Day of Prayer for a number of years, and served as Chair of that organisation. More recently, Greta led a prayer group at Stonelaw Court, 3 Johnstone Drive. This was well attended and was much appreciated by the residents, some of whom were not able to attend church.

Greta was a devoted wife, mother and grandmother, who despite increasing frailty was greatly blessed in being able to live at home with Malcolm right up to the day she died. Greta will be sadly missed by all who knew her.

Prayer Is For Everyone

We are delighted that Madalitso Chikumbanje, whom most of us know as Mada, has written once again for our church magazine. Mada and his wife Mirriam, who come from "the other Blantyre" in Malawi, are now well established in the Stonelaw family.

Prayer, together with studying the Bible, is foundational to living a victorious Christian life. It is through prayer that, among other things, we exercise the authority that we have in Christ Jesus; to enjoy fellowship with God, and present our thanksgiving, supplications, and petitions to Him. Many would agree that everyone can study the Bible, but not many would say everyone can be prayerful. For one reason or the other, we have believed that prayer is for specific individuals and we call them intercessors, prayer warriors or spiritual people. However, several portions of scripture suggest that prayer is for every Christian. For example, in describing the full armour of God, Paul said:

Pray at all times and on every occasion in the power of the Holy Spirit. Stay alert and be persistent in your prayers for all Christians everywhere.

Ephesians 6:18 (NLT)

Some will say, "But I do not know how to pray!" Well, the good news is that prayer is something which can be learnt. Here are a few biblical reflections on how that can happen:

1. Prayer can be taught or learnt

Most of us are aware of the model prayer that Jesus gave us - popularly known as the Lord's Prayer. However, we are less aware of the situation that caused Jesus to give this model prayer which we find in Luke 11 and Matthew 6. Luke's account shows us that the model prayer was an answer to the question that Jesus' disciples asked Him, as recorded in the verse below:

One day Jesus was praying in a certain place. When he finished, one of his disciples said to him, "Lord, teach us to pray, just as John taught his disciples." Luke 11:1 (NIV)

By answering this question in the manner that He did, Jesus confirmed that prayer is something that can be learnt or taught. Prayer can be learnt or taught both voluntarily, as in the example of Jesus and His disciples, and involuntarily, as evidenced among ourselves today. An excellent example of involuntary learning is observed in the apparent similarities we see in prayers that are offered by people who have fellowship (or spend time) praying together.

2. So, who is our prayer teacher?

Since praying can be learnt both voluntarily and involuntarily, we need to be conscious of who our prayer teacher is. The disciples who asked that question in Luke 11:1 wanted Jesus to be their prayer teacher. The choice of our prayer teacher is critical because it has everything to do with how much we would like to achieve in our prayer lives. Concerning teachers and students, Jesus said:

"Can a blind man lead a blind man? Will they not both fall into a pit? A student is not above his teacher, but everyone who is fully trained will be like his teacher.

Luke 6:39-40 (NIV)

Therefore, if we would like to know how effective our prayer life can become, we need to look at the effectiveness of those on whom we model our prayer life. No wonder Jesus' disciples, seeing how His prayers were being answered, asked,

"Lord, teach us to pray..." Luke 11:1

Describing some people who are not worth learning from, Jesus also said:

"And now, about prayer. When you pray, don't be like the hypocrites who love to pray publicly on street corners and in the synagogues where everyone can see them. I assure you, that is all the reward they will ever get."

Matthew 6:5 (NIV)

3. Where can I find the best prayer teacher?

Many people can teach us a lot about prayer; and we need to appreciate them. However, the best prayer teachers are in the Bible. These are people who never limited God in their prayers. What they felt in their bodies (or emotions), heard from others, or experienced did not hinder their prayer lives. Stories of people like Jesus, Paul the Apostle, Peter, Abraham, Enoch, Daniel and Moses are full of beautiful lessons on prayer and on having fellowship with God. If we took these people as our examples and teachers, where could we end up, once fully trained?

We can witness great success in prayer by using the word of God and the examples therein as our ultimate guide. Our prayers will become effectual and fervent as they will make tremendous power available. This power is dynamic in its working, causing changes over things here on earth. James expresses this idea in the verse below:

...The earnest (heartfelt, continued) prayer of a righteous man makes tremendous power available (dynamic in its working). - James 5:16 (AMPC)

Friends, prayer is for everyone and not only for specific individuals whom we have called prayer warriors. If we can breathe, we can also pray - it is that simple!

To avoid the clutter and misinformation that has surrounded prayer, let us learn from God himself how to pray, through his word and also from the reliable brothers and sisters around us. Prayer can be learnt, but may all that we learn be consistent with the word of God. If we do not know where to start, let our prayer today be in line with Luke 11:1, "Lord, teach me how to pray!"



Dear Lodging House Mission Supporters,

We are now heading into June and have been living under social distancing and shielding measures for more than two months. Many of us have adjusted to the new normal routines. Here at the Mission, for example, we now work in smaller teams with gloves, face coverings and regular hand washing. We may stand at a distance but we are all in this effort together: making welfare phone calls, preparing food or toiletries parcels, and collecting donations.

Since our last update, our Chaplaincy hotline 07864 705 668 continues to help combat isolation. Our small volunteer team have continued making up emergency food parcels and essential toiletries packs which are being delivered by our partner agencies to those most in need. We have also begun to distribute £10 shopping vouchers to those in vulnerable tenancies through Simon Community Scotland.

Among the many donations we have received was a substantial donation from Nestlé Health Science through Elaine Clarke, executive territory manager and a friend of Giffnock South Parish Church. The donation of nine products, over 55,000 items was valued at over £117,000 retail. We are grateful to the drivers and logistics team for arranging the transport from the Midlands depot. We have been working hard with our partners to make sure these that meal replacement shakes and cereal bars reach those most in need. Our thanks for local distribution go to: Social Bite, Marie Trust, the Simon Community and Turning Point Scotland for helping us to spread this kindness widely.

We have been sharing on Facebook fun photos of those out fundraising. Allison, a supporter from St Enoch Hogganfield Church, has been taking 10,000 steps to her birthday. Ian, a friend of the congregation at Greenbank Parish Church, reached new heights as he cleared moss from his neighbours' garage roofs to raise funds for LHM. Every cloud...

'Stop the world, I want to get off!'. Those words were uttered by a former teaching colleague of mine when she was very busy and felt that things were getting on top of her. Well, I wonder what she is saying now? It does feel as if the world has stopped!

No church services or meetings

No family gatherings (at the time of writing)

No visits to or from friends

No holidays

No restaurant visits

No trips with friends to the beach or to the country

No theatre, concert or cinema visits

No visits to shopping centres, the barber or the hairdresser!

I'm sure you can think of more examples.



New phrases have entered our vocabulary such as social distancing, elbow bump and self-isolating (although that term was first used as far back as 1841, when countries chose to detach themselves, politically and economically, from the rest of the world). The Oxford English Dictionary is even monitoring media coverage of Covid-19 to take account of the great social changes which the virus has brought.

News reports are depressing. Statistics and graphs do nothing to alleviate our fears. However, I would like to encourage you that it's OK to turn off the news, tune out the fear and start having praise and worship breaks throughout the day.

Remember, good things can come from bad. Examples of kind deeds during Covid-19 that Mum and I have experienced are endless: for example, when neighbours offer to go shopping and friends offer to run errands.

I have even been enjoying using technology during lockdown! I never thought I'd be saying that. My laptop has allowed me to use Zoom to see and chat to people online, for church services, meetings and get-togethers. I have enjoyed seeing and chatting to people with whom I haven't had contact for a long time. My laptop has also allowed me to view musicals by Andrew Lloyd-Webber who has streamed some of his shows for free.

The environment has also benefitted from the lockdown. You don't have to look far to see how limiting people's movements has had a positive impact. The restrictions on what people can and cannot do have seen travel companies grounding their fleets of planes. The sound of road traffic has all but disappeared. These changes have brought a reduction in air pollution across the UK. Maybe, if we maintain lower air pollution levels after this pandemic, we will even save lives?

Many parallels between Covid-19 and the Second World War were mentioned during the 75th Anniversary of VE Day on Friday 8th May. For example, people died in war on their own without family members; people didn't know when the war would end; there was to be no travelling abroad and everyone had to stay at home. Yet, the British public came through the atrocities of war and their stories have been passed down the generations and remembered to this very day. Staying in for a few months is a small price to pay to protect ourselves and the NHS.

'Every cloud has a silver lining' is a phrase that is usually said as an encouragement to a person who is overcome by some difficulty and is unable to see any positive way forward. Christians can take their encouragement from God's word - and we don't need access to a computer for that!

Psalm 46:1 reminds us that we should not fear: 'God is our refuge and strength, an ever present help in trouble.'

Here are some more verses which I find particularly reassuring:

- Consider it pure joy, my brothers and sisters, whenever you face trials of many kinds, because you know that the testing of your faith produces perseverance.
 James 1:2-3
- Be on your guard; stand firm in the faith; be courageous; be strong.
 1 Corinthians 16:13
- We have this hope as an anchor for the soul, firm and secure.

Hebrews 6:19a

So, as time moves on, make sure you test positive for FAITH, keep a safe distance from DOUBT and isolate from FEAR. Trust God through it all.

UPDATE: 12TH ANNIVERSARY AND ABERDEEN WOMEN'S CENTRE, SIERRA LEONE

Since I last updated the congregation about our hospital in Sierra Leone, much of our work in Africa has been badly affected by the COVID-19 pandemic – but we also have good news to share.

As we celebrated the 12th anniversary of Freedom From Fistula (FFF) in May, we were delighted that on 12th May, four nurses from our Aberdeen Women's Centre (AWC) in Sierra Leone participated in a video call with Her Royal Highness The Duchess of Cambridge and Her Royal Highness The Countess of Wessex, to celebrate International Nurses Day. During these difficult times, it was a real boost to the whole FFF team that our work in Sierra Leone was recognised by Their Royal Highnesses. Over the last 12 years, Freedom From Fistula has achieved so much - 8500+ fistula surgeries; 18000+ babies born; 140,000+ children treated; 300+ healthcare workers trained

As we navigate through the unchartered waters of the impact of COVID-19, short and long term, we appreciate everyone's support even more.

Sadly, our Malawi, Madagascar and Sierra Leone fistula services remain suspended due to COVID-19 but we are continuing to pay and support staff as best we can, including through the provision of maize to help feed their families. Obstetric fistulas are childbirth injuries caused by prolonged, obstructed labour, with no access to a C-section. Women become permanently incontinent and are often outcast from their communities as a result. We hope to restart our fistula programmes as soon as possible.

The remainder of our efforts have been focused on keeping open the essential maternity and child health units at our Aberdeen Women's Centre (AWC) in Sierra Leone, which so many members of Stonelaw have helped support through prayer and donations over the last few years. COVID-19 is in Sierra Leone but, thankfully, has so far not taken hold as it has in the UK.

With increased Infection Prevention Controls (IPC) and the dedication of staff, the AWC is continuing to help more than 400 women and children every week...but it is not easy. We have had to reconfigure the space in the hospital to provide isolation rooms, greater spacing between maternity beds and limited crossover between departments. We are also continually seeking sources of essential PPE supplies and have been fortunate to receive some donations through the Ministry of Health and Mercy Ships but we will need more.

Amidst it all, however, babies are still being born and bringing joy to families and we are thankful for these blessings that brighten up everyone's day. I remain grateful for your prayers and support and ask you to keep our African staff - in Malawi, Madagascar and Sierra Leone - in your prayers, as they all face their own challenges at this time.

Annie Johnson Flint

Whilst preparing for a recent funeral, I was given a poem that was dear to the deceased, 'What God Hath Promised'. The author was Annie Johnson Flint (1866-1932) from New Jersey, USA, a remarkable woman of God. Her biography explains that when Annie Johnson and her sister were orphaned they were taken in, and loved, by the Flint family. As a young woman, Annie developed rheumatoid arthritis, a condition that severely affected her life. It contorted her whole body and left her bedridden for nearly four decades. I understand she suffered further complications including incontinence, cancer and the onset of blindness.

Here is a short extract from the biography which sums up Annie Johnson Flint's character:

"Although crippled, she did not consider herself helpless; that she could do nothing but bemoan her lot. She believed that God had laid her aside for a purpose, even though that purpose was obscure to her at times. She also believed that He had work for her to do and she put her very best into the writing of her poems, rendering this ministry unto Him."

Annie Johnson Flint wrote the poem "What God Hath Promised" based on these words from Isaiah 41:10:

Good News from Christian Aid

Good News for Our Climate Too!

Some of you may have heard about Christian Aid's Big Shift Campaign against investment in fossil fuels. This focussed on HSBC's plans to fund new coal power stations in three very vulnerable countries - Bangladesh, Indonesia, and Vietnam - even though coal is the most polluting energy source, and even though renewable energy solutions would serve these countries far more effectively, and far more sustainably.

In April 2019, Diane Green from the Glasgow CA office, two other supporters and I took letters of protest to the HSBC branch on Buchanan Street. The staff we spoke to were very polite, but our visit seemed as successful as a damp squib at the time, and the replies that HSBC sent us were bland and dismissive.

However, a year later, there is good news. Thanks to thousands of emails, postcards, letters and visits, not only from Christian Aid supporters but from many other groups, HSBC announced at their AGM in April that they have cancelled their planned investment. Luke Harman, Christian Aid's Campaigns Manager, had this to say:

"Wins like this help to build the movement for climate justice. They also remind us that campaigning success can often come weeks, months or even years after the act, and that we must persevere as we strive for a more fair and just world.!

Amid personal sadness for some and worries for many, at last, a glimmer of hope from our Prime and First Ministers. There are now route maps out of the lockdown, and not a moment too soon for many of us. So I'm going to dare to look forward to our church life beyond lockdown.

First of all, I think we will have some kind of Service of Remembrance for all those who have died recently and whose funerals were restricted to close family members. We'd started having this sort of service in recent years and I think it is important for the congregation to gather together and give thanks to God for those who have died and express our support to their families. Please pray for grieving families struggling with the restrictions which must feel unnatural and even cruel at their time of loss.

After services in the church building resume, the Vacancy will pick up pace with the congregation voting for the Nomination Committee. Before then Session will have thought, prayed and come to an initial conclusion about what kind of ministry God is leading us towards. This process of discernment would normally have happened at meetings but the lockdown is making the discussion more difficult despite the use of Zoom. The congregation will also be involved in ways yet to be decided. Then our Parish Profile, which describes Stonelaw Church and the kind of minister we are being led towards, will be completed. Please do pray for elders and our Interim Moderator that they will discern God's leading through His gracious Spirit.

Finally, I hope that the benefits and lessons learned from the lockdown will continue: of simple acts of kindness shown to neighbours and strangers, the challenge to familiar routines resulting in new ways of doing things, the humbling of a busy world overconfident in its own abilities, a rediscovered hunger for human relationships, a willingness to consider a more radical discipleship of Jesus and an openness to the big question "What is God asking of us for the future?"
