#### From our Interim Moderator

Dear new friends at Stonelaw,

My name is Scott Kirkland and I am minister at Maxwell Mearns Castle Church in Newton Mearns. I accepted the Presbytery's invitation to become your "Interim Moderator" with great pleasure but also with some trepidation, at following in Alistair's large footsteps!

As Interim Moderator, I effectively become your minister. I have already chaired two very pleasant Kirk Sessions and worshipped with you twice. You have a very diligent Session Clerk in David McTaggart and a committed eldership. Please pray for them as they help steer you through this period. We sometimes speak of a "period of vacancy". However, Jesus Christ remains head of His church at Stonelaw, your Session Clerk and elders are still at the helm and you are still a worshipping and serving congregation. There is no vacancy here!

Each Sunday, it will be the Rev John Martindale you see. He may even chap your door. John has been appointed by your Kirk Session as "locum". In addition to leading worship, John will work two additional days a week. I know John will give himself fully to your care. Please pray for him and assist him as he seeks to minister to you. In your church magazine in March, John gave a brief outline of the vacancy process. That has now begun and we are currently awaiting the visit of an advisory committee from Presbytery, which should be imminent.

I suspect much will have happened by the time you read these words. However, Covid-19 is creating considerable uncertainty. As we steward ourselves through this period, I am inviting the Kirk Session to set up an assessment team. My hope is that this group will make decisions and keep you posted of any changes necessary to our congregational life as the Covid-19 situation develops. The greatest onus, however, rests on each of us following the medical advice given by the Government. This advice presently includes washing our hands well and regularly, controlling our coughing/sneezing, not touching our faces and minimizing physical contact with other people.


While your normal habit might be to "soldier on" through colds, bugs and viruses etc, it is advisable at this time, to recover first before re-entering congregational life.

However, be absolutely assured of this, God is sovereign and to be trusted in whatever dark shadow we find ourselves; including outbreaks of Covid-19. The Lord is the Shepherd of His people and there is a peace from His presence to be known whatever life brings to us. Can Covid-19 separate us from the love of God in Christ? Be assured: Romans 8 says a resounding "NO!"

I look forward to getting to know you better as we embark together on this exciting journey seeking the Lord for a new minister at Stonelaw.

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# From our Locum Minister

As I write we are in the grip of the Covid-19 pandemic. Across the globe people are fretting and feel very worried about the outcome. It is right for us to be concerned and to do all in our power to combat this virus and mitigate its devastating effects. Paradoxically, it is in time of crises and calamity that people ask the big questions about life; it's origin, meaning and outcome. As Christians, we already understand without God there is no meaning to life. Yet, we still fret over things like Covid19. But we must never lose sight of the fact that God is in control of all things. Indeed, in Christ and His cross, God has dealt with sin and its destructive effects.

Currently, we are journeying through Lent, anticipating the celebration of Easter Day. On that day, we had hoped to gather in worship, and join the Christian Church on earth and in heaven, to proclaim our risen and glorified Lord, Jesus Christ.

I recall a story from the time of the Communist regime in the former Soviet Union. Having entered a debate about Christianity, a Party Official addressed the gathering. His 'opponent', an elderly Orthodox Priest, sat impassively as the man railed against Christianity. He mocked and ridiculed the faith using all the old hackneyed expressions: 'the opium of the masses'; 'the crutch for the weak' and so on. He berated the 'gullible' for believing in something which 'could not be proven'. He quipped against 'the myth of Jesus' and 'all the false lies which comprised the Gospel'. For an intense period, the Communist leader spoke vehemently against God, Christ and Christ's followers.

At the end of his passionate and reasoned assault he took his seat, content that his logical argument would persuade everyone that Christianity was 'irrational, superstitious and absurd'. How could the frail old priest respond?

The old priest took the rostrum. He looked towards the communist and paused as though thinking. He turned toward the audience and cleared his throat, heightening the anticipation of his opponent who sensed he was finding it hard to know how to begin to reply. Then the man of God opened his mouth and said in an unwavering voice, "Christ is risen". Immediately the audience rose as one and declared, "He is risen indeed".

The world thinks that faith is futile, but the reverse is true, because to us who have eyes of faith, the wisdom of the world is foolish. The message of the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved, it is the power of God (1 Corinthians 1<sup>18</sup>). Christians *know* that Jesus Christ has risen. Although it proceeds from faith, we need not abandon intellect, reason, logic or argument in making that statement. History testifies to Jesus. It declares He was crucified under Pontius Pilate. He died on the cross and the tomb in which He was laid was empty on the Sunday. There is not one word from the first or second centuries written denying the fact of the empty tomb or claiming the discovery of the corpse. How the tomb came to be empty has been argued, but the only plausible (and indeed rational and logical) explanation is that Jesus rose from the dead!

As believers, we need to have far more confidence in the historicity and accuracy of the Bible, more confidence to stand against those who deny it and demand that <u>they prove</u> <u>their point</u>. For too long we have allowed the world to deny the truth of the Scriptures without any evidence to back it up. They have no evidence, only hypothesis and supposition. The Scriptures are there to be examined! All other documents from that time are far less well attested, yet far more readily accepted as accurate and true!!

There are massive implications for the world and for every single person in the world, for me and for you, in the resurrection of Christ. Firstly, you cannot say that there is no resurrection. Secondly, you cannot ignore Jesus. And thirdly, you cannot continue in unbelief. (See 1 Corinthians 15<sup>12ff</sup>)

Think about it: every promise Jesus made will come to pass. What does that mean for your life and the way you live?

Since Jesus rose from the dead, we too shall rise! Physical death is not the end; eternal life, which belongs to those who believe in Jesus, is ours. What the Scripture says is true: death has been swallowed up in victory; our sins are forgiven; we can have fellowship with God; He is with us in every circumstance, even in the midst of pandemics; He will come again and take us home. All this is available because Christ is risen. He is risen indeed.

# Keeping busy and happy at home



These suggestions may seem obvious, but possibly helpful? They are taken partly from a list produced by a London Council Borough, and partly from suggestions made by Helen Paulsen and her family. This page is for the entire Stonelaw family! We've excluded any tips requiring access to the Internet. However, for online ideas, visit the website at the foot of the page.

**1. Writing letters or cards and making phone calls** can make someone's day at a time like this, and help you to feel better, too. You could even plan with a friend to have tea and a biscuit along with your chat!

#### 2. Walk outside, if you can.

Remember it's okay to leave our homes once a day for exercise, alone or with someone from the same household. Why not count how many pictures of rainbows you see in windows, or daffodils, or different types of bird that you see or hear?

#### 3. Gardening, if that is possible for you.

With the weather improving, keep yourself active and start gardening. Maybe plant some seeds? If you need advice, phone a friend or relative.

#### 4. Try a simple daily workout.

If social distancing has made you feel a bit down, try gentle exercise to boost your mood. Look out for a forthcoming BBC TV class. Please choose activities which are safe, and not unduly strenuous - our NHS staff have more than enough to deal with!

**5. Reread a favourite book**, or try something new – something in your house that you've been meaning to read for a while? Or a book of the Bible that you'd like to re-read, or discover? Borrowing books and magazines should be possible, so long as you do so safely. BBC Radio 4 dramas and readings, and Audiobooks, are another option.

#### 6. Challenge your brain!

Look out any puzzle books, jigsaws, playing cards or language learning materials that you have in the house, and spend some time completely distracting yourself. Many newspapers, including 'The Reformer' have a good puzzle page.

#### 7. Work on your cooking skills.

Try out a new recipe! Look up recipe books or magazines for inspiration. If you have a freezer with a little space left, you could save something for another day.

#### 9. Spring clean your home.

Any jobs that need doing, like de-cluttering your surfaces (*if you live in my house*!) cupboards, shelves and drawers, may help you enjoy being at home more.

# Message from the Treasurer about the Financial Implications for Stonelaw Church of COVID-19

As we all know, the Coronavirus is having a significant impact on all aspects of our lives and, unfortunately, Stonelaw Church is no exception. This message is to alert you to the financial effects, what is being done to limit these and how you can help.

Looking at the 2019 accounts, around 30% of our income came through the offering plate. This includes both those who give using the Free Will Offering envelopes and those who put cash in the plate. This equates to around £2,500 to £3,500 a month. Without Sunday services, this income source will end and our General Fund will be depleted completely within around 3-4 months.

The other 70% of the income is largely from those who give by standing order. However, it also includes other income such as the rent the Pre School pays, donations from Stonelaw Church organisations such as the Toddlers and the Café @ the Meeting Place (£4,000). Given the present emergency all these activities have had to be suspended. Of course, right now we do not know how long the restrictions are going to last but the indications are that they could be very lengthy. If this indeed is the case our other income sources will dry up.

We will of course look very closely at our expenditure. Some costs will naturally fall; electricity and gas usage being the most obvious example. Any maintenance requirements on our buildings will be scrutinised in detail before we commit to any expenditure. Having said this, whilst we can control some of our expenditure, the majority of our outgoings are fixed. This includes our Ministry and Mission payments to the Church of Scotland. (As we are in vacancy this will reduce but it is effectively balanced by the salary of our Locum Minister). It also includes our local staffing costs / pensions and such things as insurance.

In summary, we need to think very carefully, both about our income and our expenditure. For those who usually give weekly in the plate with either Free Will Offering envelopes or cash, I would ask that you consider making donations either by one-off bank transfers or, preferably, by setting up a regular standing order. This would ensure our income is maintained at this time. For those who are able, please would you consider increasing your donation? This will help offset the reduction in other

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income that we are anticipating.

I appreciate that this request is coming at a difficult time for many of us. Please remember that you can reduce or stop your donations at any time.

If you are a UK taxpayer, donating through the Gift Aid scheme means that we are able to claim back 25 pence for every £1 that you give - without giving anything extra. If you would like to give using the Gift Aid scheme, you will need to complete a declaration form which is also available on <u>https://stonelawchurch.org/giving</u> or on page 27 of this magazine. The Gift Aid form should be completed and returned to lain Morrison as the Freewill Offering Treasurer, Flat G/L, 5 Parkhill Drive, Rutherglen, G73 2PJ. If possible, please keep lain updated with any changes either to the way you give, or to the amount, so that he can keep his records accurately.

I trust you will give this request your prayerful consideration.

# Knowing, and Knowing about God

We are delighted that Madalitso Chikumbanje, whom most of us know as Mada, has written once again for our church magazine. Thank you, Mada! He and his wife Mirriam, who come from "the other Blantyre" in Malawi, are now well established in the Stonelaw Church family.

Do you know the Prime Minister? Many of us will say, "What a question! Everyone knows the Prime Minister!" But how well do we know him? For many of us, an honest answer is, "Not so well, apart from his name and what we read or see of him in the media." In short, many of us do not know the Prime Minister but we know about him. All our judgements, opinions, and views of him are based on what we know **about** him rather than real knowledge of him.

This may seem like an argument over semantics, but it is a genuine issue in any believer's life. In many ways, most of us know a lot **about** God but we don't really know Him personally. A thorough read of the Bible will bear testimony that there is a stark difference between those who "know God" and those who "know **about** Him". The ordeal of the seven sons of Sceva and some evil spirits (which we can read about in Acts 19:13-16) is a good example of the weaknesses associated with merely knowing about God. But why should we seriously consider knowing God?

#### Because Knowing God = Eternal Life

Without the use of any scriptural reference, it is easy to define eternal life as living forever. However, the story of Lazarus and the rich man, recorded in Luke 16:19-31, shows us that people do not necessarily cease to exist when they physically die. By default, each one of our spirits will live forever whether in heaven or in hell. Therefore, "living forever" is a very weak meaning of biblical eternal life. To help us understand this, Jesus defined eternal life as follows:

"And this is eternal life: [it means] to know (to perceive, recognize, become acquainted with, and understand) You, the only true and real God, and [likewise] to know Him, Jesus [as the] Christ (the Anointed One, the Messiah), Whom You have sent." - John 17:3 (Amplified Bible)

Simply put, eternal life means knowing God, and Jesus Christ whom He has sent. This definition is fundamental because it reduces eternal life to an everyday working relationship between God and us where we come to know God more and more intimately. We might be born again and on course for heaven but if we do not know God, we become vulnerable to many acts of the enemy. However, God wants us to live a victorious Christian life every day. We are not waiting for death before we can experience eternal life. It is something we should already be having right now. As John puts it:

"I write these things to you who believe in the name of the Son of God so that you may know that you have eternal life" - 1 John 5:13 (NIV)

#### Because Knowing God = Grace and Peace

There are so many people who do not totally like God (or are confused about Him) because they have been greatly misinformed about Him. This group of people includes both church goers and non-church-goers. It is possible to attend church services regularly but still have a wrong image of God. Deception is everywhere nowadays. The trouble with deception is this: it dims our ability to differentiate between what is true and

what just looks true. As someone else put it, the problem with deception is that it is really deceiving.

For example, some among us believe that the challenges we face in life come from God and their purpose is to teach us something. Well, this is deception to the core! Why is this so? In Colossians 2:9, we read, "For in Christ the fullness of God lives in a human body." In all His stay here on earth, Jesus never gave someone a disease, a misfortune, etc simply to teach them a lesson. On the contrary, He went about doing good and healing those who were oppressed by the devil. Having said that, some may ask, "How does God teach us then?" The Bible says:

All Scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness, that the man of God may be complete, thoroughly equipped for every good work. - 2 Timothy 3:16-17 (NKJV)

Therefore, where do our troubles come from? They come from the devil through the fallen nature of humanity. When we come to understand this, we shall be able to firmly stand against the enemy in the things that he throws at us. But we cannot accurately discern this and many other kinds of deception if we do not have a true knowledge of God. Once we move from merely knowing **about** God into knowing Him and His personality, we shall experience more grace and peace than ever before. As Peter puts it:

Grace and peace be multiplied to you in the knowledge of God and of Jesus our Lord - 2 Peter 1:2 (NKJV)

#### Because Knowing God = Exploits and Wonders

Some of us may wish to see the intervention of God in our everyday situations as He did with many other people in the Bible. To comfort ourselves, we have settled to the idea that God is not intervening in people's situations in this present day and age. However, those thoughts are unscriptural and help to reinforce a false image of God in our minds. While He was here on earth, Jesus said in John 14:12, "*The truth is, anyone who believes in me will do the same works I have done, and even greater works, because I am going to be with the Father.*" The question is, "Why are the works of God very scarce in our day and age?" There may be many reasons for that but one of them is that many of us have not made the effort to know God beyond what we are just told. As written in Daniel, there is benefit in knowing God:

"...but the people who know their God shall be strong, and carry out great exploits. - Daniel 11:32 (NKJV)

In conclusion, scripture is clear on the importance of knowing God. Knowing God is foundational to living a successful Christian life that both pleases God and takes advantage of the benefits that we have in Him. No wonder Paul said, in Philippians 3:10 (NIV) "*I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection...*" Unfortunately, many have delegated the responsibility of knowing God to other people such as ministers, church elders, deacons, etc. Friends, knowing God can never be delegated in any way or form. We need to seek to know him personally, through prayer, Bible reading and Christian fellowship, even in these difficult times.

May knowing God be our everyday ambition. Be blessed and be encouraged of God.

# **Recycling Project begins**



# in partnership with Burgh Primary Rotakids

**STOP PRESS** Although we can't meet in church just now, you can still support the Rotakids team by saving your empty crisp packets at home (if space allows) so please read on! Many thanks to Kiera McCabe, P7 pupil at Burgh Primary School for writing this article.

Perhaps you already know that our church has started to collect crisp packets for recycling, but you may not know any of the details, so here they are!

#### How are we doing it?

There is a box in the Meeting Place where you can put your crisp packets if you want them to be recycled. The box will then be taken to Burgh Primary School and put in a special bin, which is only for crisp packets. The Rotakids team at the school will then send the contents of the bin to be recycled.

#### Who are the Rotakids?

The Rotakids are a junior version of the Rotary Club. Rotakids do projects that help our environment and our community. The Rutherglen Rotary Club paid for our team's bin.

#### Why are we doing it?

Well, we are doing it for two reasons:

- 1. To help the environment, because crisp packets aren't usually recyclable. They *look* like foil, which can be recycled, but they're actually made from a metallised plastic that cannot be recycled through normal recycling bins. They end up in landfill sites or in the sea.
- 2. Each crisp packet we collect will help us to earn points. These points can be added up to charitable gifts for example a chicken might be given to a poor village. This can provide the village with up to 200 eggs a year.


#### Some simple rules for effective recycling of crisp packets

# **Covid-19 and Stonelaw Church – the story unfolds**

# Email No 1; 14th March 2020

#### From John Liggat, Session Elder, on behalf of Stonelaw Kirk Session:

At the suggestion of our Interim Moderator, I am (in the absence of our Session Clerk, David McTaggart, who is currently visiting family in South Africa) putting together an assessment team (membership to be finalised but including our Locum John Martindale, Therese Reid, Stuart Menzies, Janis Neil, Alan Jenkins and myself) to monitor our response to the Covid-19 concern.

This team will monitor the situation daily and will make known any change in response which we need to make. **At this stage**, there is no need to cancel any core activity of our church life; that would be premature but the team is monitoring the situation daily. We will make known speedily any changes necessary.

The greatest onus is on **each of us** following medical advice given by the Government which presently includes washing our hands well / regularly and controlling our coughing/sneezing and self-isolating if you have a persistent cough. Whilst your normal habit might be to "soldier on" through colds/bugs/viruses etc. it is advisable at this time, to recover first before re-entering congregational life. On an immediate practical level, we will:

- 1. Not pass the collection plates around, instead have a central collection drop-off.
- 2. Remove the shared Pew Bibles and Hymn Books. The reading will be shown in full on the screen on Sunday mornings.
- Not circulate a paper announcement sheet. This week's sheet is available <u>here</u>

   if you would like to receive it in future weeks, please sign up now on

- 4. Encourage you to minimise contact (like shaking hands) and try not to stand too close to other people. Please note the minister will not shake hands at the door.

In another initiative the Sound and Vision Team will begin to record entire services (not just the sermons). So, if you are unable to join us for Sunday worship, you can access recordings from <u>http://stonelawchurch.org/sermon</u>. It is hoped these will be available by early afternoon every Sunday. We are exploring the possibility of live-streaming the service but cannot promise when this will happen.

#### To end, some words from Scott Kirkland, our Interim Moderator:

God is sovereign and to be trusted even through outbreaks of Covid-19 and other dark shadows which cast themselves over our lives in other ways. He is Shepherd of His people and there is a peace to be known that comes with His presence whatever life brings to us.

Can Covid-19 separate us from the love of God in Christ? Be assured that Romans 8 says a resounding "NO!"

And a prayer from the Rev Louise Collins, of Hertfordshire, quoted by the Bishop of St Albans on Twitter:

Dear God our Shield and our Defender, guide and protect my neighbour in this time of health emergency; deliver them from all harm and may your love and care ever grow in this place. Through Jesus Christ, Our Lord, Amen.

**Message to Members and Adherents from the Covid-19 Task Group** – Present: Alan Jenkins, John Liggat, Rev John Martindale, Janis Neil, Stuart Menzies, Therese Reid, Jackie Sheppard

At our meeting after this morning's service, we made the following decisions:

- 1. **Morning and Evening Services** will continue as per this morning's service with one change: people will be invited to put their offering in the plate as they enter the church.
- 2. The **Mothering Sunday Service** due to take place on 22<sup>nd</sup> March has been cancelled.
- 3. The **Fish Supper Lunch**, due to take place on Sunday 19<sup>th</sup> April has been cancelled.
- 4. **The Café @ the Meeting Place** will close from Monday 16<sup>th</sup> March. This was not an easy decision as we know the value it brings to many but we have a Duty of Care to our customers and volunteers.
- 5. **Discoverers** we will follow guidance for schools.

# Coronavirus guidance for Christian Aid Week events and activities

As all of our thoughts are on the Covid-19 situation, we wanted to share an update on Christian Aid's response. We have been receiving enquiries from volunteers about how to keep safe when fundraising for Christian Aid Week. The health and safety of our community, including loyal supporters like you, is of the utmost importance to us, and we are monitoring the situation on a daily basis.

Many of you will have been planning for the Bridge Cross Challenge, house-to-house collections and events. Under the current circumstances, sadly, the Bridge Cross Challenge and house-to-house collections should be cancelled. In particular, along with many churches, events such as Big Brekkies or Lent Lunches, where food is shared, cannot go ahead. We are looking at alternative ways to virtually meet, share and pray with supporters over the coming months in the likely absence of physical church services.

We are working on alternative plans that will allow people to take part in Christian Aid Week in different, creative ways – by post, by text and online that strengthen our communities during this challenging time. Christian Aid Week is our single-most important fundraiser, so we would welcome your ideas on how we can creatively show love for our neighbours at home and abroad, as a community. Please call your usual Christian Aid contact \* or get in touch by email or telephone, see details below.

Christian Aid and our partners already have experience of limiting the spread of infection during the Ebola crisis, and we will build on this experience to continue to stand together with communities living in poverty during this period. If infection rates start to develop as in Europe, then people in poorer countries will be hit even harder. Many are already living with reduced health resilience because of extreme poverty, or in overcrowded humanitarian camps and in countries which do not have the healthcare infrastructures needed to combat widespread disease. We will be working on the ground to help prepare communities to limit the impact of Covid-19.

We are praying for all those affected by this new virus, both in Britain and overseas, for all those working on the frontline and for wisdom for our leaders. We will continue to monitor the situation as it evolves. During this challenging time, we all need to take seriously the science and advice being offered, remaining calm but vigilant.
