Letter from our Locum Minister

In a short while, Alistair May will be inducted into his new charge and Rutherglen: Stonelaw will become vacant. To allay any fears, let me outline a little of the process that lies ahead.

Firstly, the Presbytery appoints an Interim Moderator. This is a working minister with full responsibility for his or her own congregation, who agrees to lead another congregation during a vacancy. He deals with Kirk Session, Managers and so on, but because he can't be in two places at once, a Locum Minister is appointed to preach and do some pastoral work.

A team from Presbytery will visit and offer guidance as the Interim Moderator and officebearers form a Nominating Committee from the congregation. This committee will be responsible for bringing a suitable candidate to be considered as its new minister. The whole process will take time - a year or more may well pass before a new minister is appointed. During that time all the work has to keep going as seamlessly as possible. A great deal of responsibility will fall on the officebearers, especially on the Session Clerk. It is vitally important that the congregation pulls together and supports their efforts, in practical ways and, especially, in prayer.

I have been engaged as Locum Minister, so I will be taking Sunday services plus working for two days during the week. However, let me stress this: if anyone is in need of a minister, **please do not hesitate** to contact me; I will do my utmost to help.

The appointment of a new minister is a huge matter for any congregation. What kind of

minister would you like to see? Often, the job description reads: "Someone who can preach brilliantly, is a team player, will increase the numbers numerically and financially, has good management skills, will be available at all times, is good with children, can engage with teens, will bring in families, include the elderly, visit often, will not upset anybody - and give us an easy life."

The reality is, such a person does not exist! The crux for the congregation is to identify which particular strengths it needs in their new minister - and that requires a vision for the future. What is your vision for 2020 and beyond? What kind of minister/ ministry? More properly, what is *God's* vision for Stonelaw?

In Acts 2:42-47 a fledgling Church is finding its feet. You will notice the importance of meeting, worshipping, having fellowship and praying – all of these done together - and of the need to depend on the Holy Spirit to direct them.

Congregations that fare best in a vacancy are those in which the people do likewise: spending time together, working together, praying together, seeking God's vision and will for their congregation together – so pulling together in the "right" direction.

I am here to help in that endeavour, so that you may be fruitful for Christ in this place and beyond.

Dear friends,

Goodbyes are always hard, this one particularly, because I am so grateful to God for the best part of two decades that we have spent at Stonelaw and for all the joys, tears, successes and failures we have experienced together. There are simply too many to mention here, and too many people (some of them no longer with us) to thank.

In 2001, you called an untested young minister. Thank you for that. I came on a shortterm five-year reviewable contract and God (and you) allowed me to stay. Thank you for that. Over those many years we have seen the community and congregation change, and the building significantly reshaped, as we have prayed, served, and grown together. And we have known the support of a warm Christian community that has embraced us and our growing daughters. Thank you for that.

For those who weren't present when announcements were made, a word of explanation. About 18 months ago, we had a clear sense that God was indicating this was the final chapter of our time at Stonelaw. It wasn't that anything was wrong, quite the reverse. We were very comfortable. Things were going well, and there was no reason to want to change that. But, perhaps, that's the dangerous bit. This Christian journey isn't meant to be comfortable. Over that period, even as God was blessing so much at Stonelaw, and I was excited about what God would do here next, there was a growing sense that the next chapter for Stonelaw was not mine to lead. We began to explore other possibilities and then, as a conversation opened in Motherwell, everything fell into place. The call to move there became as clear as the call to come to Stonelaw was in 2001.

I confess to a feeling of guilt as we made the decision to move. Leaving folk we love, and leaving them without a minister, did seem a little selfish. However, I do believe that if this move is right for us, it will also be a blessing for you too. We have already seen signs that God will provide for Stonelaw, and that the future will be exciting. I wait to see what he will do among you, and in this building that you have dedicated not to your comfort but to the mission among the community. And please, never, ever, describe yourselves as vacant – you are full: full of God's Holy Spirit and rich in so many people with strong spiritual and practical giftings. Indeed, without a full-time minister, you may well find increased opportunity to see each other grow and flourish.

I know I leave you in capable hands with John Martindale, your locum. But you are not in John's hands but those of God and each other. Please look after one other. Be bold, prayerful and active in the months ahead, and always be vigilant for anything that might disrupt your bonds of love and peace.

Lastly, I appreciate your kindness to us in these recent weeks, and your generous leaving gift. Next time you're in Motherwell, the kettle will be on.

Elementary Food Hygiene Course

The church has a legal responsibility to ensure that the food which we serve, and those serving it, meet appropriate standards. On Saturday 18th January, eight Stonelaw members, along with five from Burnside and three from Calderwood After School Care, attended an Elementary Food Hygiene Course in our Main Hall.



All participants have now been awarded a certificate to show that they have reached an appropriate standard of Food Hygiene training. The list in the downstairs kitchen will be updated accordingly. If you are organising a catering event at Stonelaw, one of the accredited people on that list should be present.

Over the next few weeks, we will be putting in place guidelines and record-keeping to ensure that we are complying with the law and following Church of Scotland guidelines whenever food is being prepared or served on our premises. Our trainer Elaine (a former Environmental Health Officer) was very helpful in guiding us as to what we need to do. More information will follow.

Overview of 2019 Accounts

The Treasurer's report below shows the income and outgoings in the General Fund on a cash basis. Thanks almost entirely to the generosity of the congregation in giving throughout the year and in responding to the appeal at the end of the year, £985.52 more was raised than was spent in the General Fund.

Offerings through the year, between Freewill Offering Envelopes, Standing Orders and Ordinary Offerings, were almost the same as last year.

There was a significant increase in Gift Aid tax recovery due to a one-off windfall from new Gift Aid forms signed in 2019 which allowed tax to be reclaimed on previous years' donations.

Costs were higher in 2019 due to a higher than expected energy bill. This is being investigated.
